HOKKAIDO VALLEY

FOR DECADES, THE northern Japanese island of Hokkaido has been famous for two things: its world-class **powder snow**¹ and for **supplying**² over half of the country's milk. But now a new **crop**³ is being planted, one made of silicon. Japan is making a multi-billion dollar **gamble**⁴ to transform its **agricultural**⁵ **heartland**⁶ into a global **semiconductor**⁷ superpower.

If you walk through the city of Chitose today, the view is changing. Where once there were only **open fields**⁸, **cranes**⁹ now dominate the **skyline**¹⁰, constructing **vast**¹¹ **research centres**¹² and **factories**¹³. It is all part of a plan to create "Hokkaido Valley", Japan's answer to **Silicon Valley**¹⁴, and **reboot**¹⁵ a **national industry**¹⁶ that has **fallen behind**¹⁷ its Asian **neighbours**¹⁸. The goal is ambitious: to transform this quiet, snowy island into a major **contender**¹⁹ in the USD 600 bln global race to supply the **computer chips**²⁰ that power everything from our smartphones to **Artificial Intelligence**²¹.

Leading the charge²² is Rapidus, a new company **backed by**²³ the Japanese **government**²⁴ and titans like Toyota and Sony. Their mission is to build **fabrication plants**²⁵ **capable of**²⁶ producing **cutting-edge**²⁷ 2-nanometre (2nm) chips by 2027. Currently, only industry leaders TSMC and Samsung operate at this level. By partnering with IBM and Dutch semiconductor company ASML, Rapidus aims to **leapfrog**²⁸ several generations of development to join this elite club.

Rapidus CEO Atsuyoshi Koike chose Hokkaido for two **essentials**²⁹: water and stability. Chipmaking **requiring**³⁰ massive amounts of **ultra-pure**³¹ water, which the island has **in abundance**³². **Furthermore**³³, the region is less **prone to**³⁴ the **earthquakes**³⁵ that **plague**³⁶ the rest of Japan, offering the stable ground necessary for microscopic precision.

The Japanese government is **all in**³⁷. Between 2020 and 2024, it **poured** USD 27 bln **into**³⁸ the chip sector, a higher percentage of its **GDP**³⁹ than even the United States. In late 2024, Tokyo **unveiled**⁴⁰ another package worth USD 65 bln to support AI and chip **development**⁴¹. But writing cheques is the easy part. Japan faces a demographic **time bomb**⁴². Its population is **shrinking**⁴³, and the country is **bracing** **for**⁴⁴ a **shortage**⁴⁵ of 40,000 engineers in the coming years. With over a third of the national budget already consumed by **welfare**⁴⁶ for the **elderly**⁴⁷, money for training and education is **squeezed**⁴⁸. Rapidus is partnering with Hokkaido University to train **new blood**⁴⁹, but **admits**⁵⁰ it will need to rely on **foreign talent**⁵¹, a **sensitive topic**⁵² in a country that has historically been **resistant to**⁵³ immigration.

To compete with the massive scale of Taiwan's TSMC, Rapidus is betting on speed. Koike's strategy is to **deliver**⁵⁴ **bespoke**⁵⁵, **custom**⁵⁶ chips for AI three times faster than his rivals. It is a daring industrial push; if successful, it could secure Japan's economic future and create a vital new **supply chain**⁵⁷ for the world.

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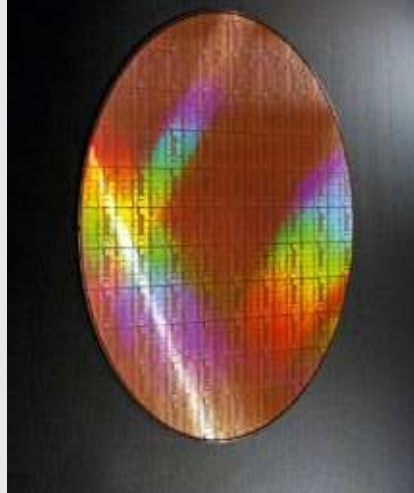

The Nanometre Race

In the world of microchips, smaller is always better. The “nanometre” (nm) number refers to the size of the transistors on a chip. The smaller the transistor, the more you can pack onto a single chip, making your phone or computer faster and more energy-efficient.

- **10nm – 7nm:** The standard for most modern electronics a few years ago.
- **5nm – 3nm:** The current cutting edge, found in the latest premium smartphones (dominated by TSMC in Taiwan).
- **2nm:** The next **frontier**¹. This is the **Holy Grail**² that Rapidus, Samsung, and TSMC are all racing to mass produce. By **leaping straight**³ to 2nm, Japan is **attempting**⁴ to **skip**⁵ several generations of development to **catch up with**⁶ the leaders in one go⁷.

THE COST OF THE INTERNET

THESE DAYS, MOST of us **take access**¹ to the internet **for granted**², and for those working from home, it's a **must-have**³. As such, like **car tyres**⁴ or **insurance**⁵, it can be something of a **grudge purchase**⁶. We **bemoan**⁷ how much we have to pay for what has become **essential**⁸. However, Polish **residents**⁹ should not feel too **hard done by**¹⁰, as their **tariffs**¹¹ are better than most.

A 2025 **survey**¹² **conducted**¹³ by Cable.co.uk **revealed**¹⁴ the best and worst countries for internet value for money. Prices were **measured**¹⁵ by Mbps of **fixed broadband**¹⁶ **bandwidth**¹⁷ converted into USD for **comparison**¹⁸. To put that **in layman's terms**¹⁹, Mbps stands for megabits per second, a unit of data transfer speed; Broadband is a fixed connection such as **fibre**²⁰ or cable, and bandwidth **refers to**²¹ the maximum **capacity**²² of that connection – how much data can be transferred per second. Your monthly subscription price will show what you pay for a certain internet speed. For example, if you pay USD 100 per month for a 20 Mbps connection, the unit cost **works out**²³ at USD 5.00 per Mbps. **As clear as mud**²⁴? Let's **get down to business**²⁵ with the winners and losers.

By far the most expensive country is the UAE (United Arab Emirates), where two **exclusive**²⁶ **state providers**²⁷ hold a duopoly, **charging**²⁸ a very **stiff**²⁹ **average**³⁰ price of USD 4.31. Prices in Switzerland are **commensurate**³¹ with the high **standard of living**³² there at USD 2.07. However, it is perhaps surprising, and challenging for customers in the lower-income countries of Ghana, Kenya and Morocco, that they also **feature**³³ in the top five most expensive places to purchase internet access.

How about Europe? Germany is the only EU country with an average tariff above a dollar at USD 1.04. Many European countries, including the UK, are in the **range**³⁴ of USD 0.20 – 36; however, some come in

well below this figure. France and Hungary offer internet at USD 0.06 per Mbps, while Poland is three cents, and Romania is just a single cent. **How come**³⁵ the price is so **varied**³⁶?

The standard of living, **wage**³⁷ levels and customer **expectations**³⁸ **play a part**³⁹, so the wealthier may **not bat an eyelid**⁴⁰ at a higher price. The **rollout**⁴¹ of cheap internet in Central and Eastern Europe, as well as lower average wages (making technical support cheaper), has also been driven by EU and national **government**⁴² support in **digital infrastructure**⁴³ funding. Regulation has **ensured**⁴⁴ **healthy competition**⁴⁵, while high **urban density**⁴⁶ has made installation and **coverage**⁴⁷ more **cost-efficient**⁴⁸ for providers. Coming late to the game has also been **fortuitous**⁴⁹, **enabling**⁵⁰ the likes of Poland and Romania to **leapfrog**⁵¹ older technologies such as **copper-based**⁵² telephone lines and go straight to **fibre-optics**⁵³, with Romania **boasting**⁵⁴ the highest fibre penetration in Europe – by the end of 2023, 93 percent of **localities**⁵⁵ were covered by fibre-optic technology, **facilitating**⁵⁶ at least 1 Gbps.

The internet may be a global phenomenon, but the cost of accessing it, even **taking into account**⁵⁷ local **purchasing power**⁵⁸, is far

THE STREAM¹ DREAM

OVER THE LAST quarter-century, the world has **transitioned²** from living rooms **lined with³ dusty⁴ shelves⁵** of DVDs and compact discs to an era where our entire **entertainment⁶** library lives in the “cloud.” Paul Martin streams the history of the **disruptors⁷** that broke the old system, and the complex reality they have built in its place.

The Red Envelope⁸

Before “streaming” existed, the dominant way to watch a film at home was the **brick-and-mortar⁹ rental shop¹⁰**, **epitomised¹¹** by companies like Blockbuster Video. Customers travelled to a physical shop, **browsed¹²** a **limited selection¹³**, paid for a few nights of rental, and returned the disc; often with a **late fee¹⁴** if they missed the **deadline¹⁵**.

Netflix removed the shop entirely. **Instead of¹⁶** thousands of expensive **retail fronts¹⁷**, it used centralised **warehouses¹⁸** that could **store¹⁹** far more titles, including **rare²⁰** and older films that local shops had no **space²¹** for. Customers ordered online, and DVDs arrived in thin red envelopes: lightweight, **durable²²**, and instantly **recognisable²³** across the United States.

This huge catalogue **reflected²⁴** the business idea known as the “**Long Tail²⁵**”: instead of **relying on²⁶** a **handful of²⁷** major hits, a company can profit by offering thousands of **niche²⁸** options that each attract small but **steady²⁹** audiences³⁰. Blockbuster made its money from the hits; Netflix made money from everything else as well.

In 1999, Netflix **introduced³¹** a second innovation: the **subscription model³²**. By **charging³³** a flat monthly **fee³⁴** rather than a per-rental price, the company shifted users from “renting” individual **items³⁵** to “accessing” a library. But the **subsequent³⁶** move

from physical post to digital streaming was not **smooth³⁷**. In 2011, CEO Reed Hastings attempted to **split** the DVD business **into³⁸** a **separate³⁹ service⁴⁰** called “Qwikster,” **forcing** customers **to⁴¹** manage two accounts at a higher combined cost. **Backlash⁴²** was **immediate⁴³**: 800,000 subscribers **cancelled⁴⁴**, the **share price⁴⁵** **collapsed⁴⁶** and the plan was **scrapped⁴⁷**. But the direction was clear: Netflix was preparing to **abandon⁴⁸** physical media entirely.

The Grand Bargain⁴⁹

While Netflix disrupted video rental, Spotify entered a music industry in **free-fall⁵⁰**. By the mid-2000s, CD sales were collapsing, and **illegal⁵¹ downloading⁵²** via sites like Napster dominated. Spotify offered a legal alternative: access to almost any song for free (with **ads⁵³**) or via a **paid tier⁵⁴**. To **launch⁵⁵**, it needed licences from **major labels⁵⁶** **terrified⁵⁷** the free model would **finish off⁵⁸** their remaining sales. Negotiations

dragged on⁵⁹ for years. To secure rights⁶⁰, Spotify offered labels equity⁶¹, large upfront payments⁶², and a slow, invitation-only rollout⁶³ to control demand⁶⁴. When it finally launched in the US in 2011, it helped stabilise the industry⁶⁵, but created a new controversy by only paying artists fractions⁶⁶ of a cent per stream instead of dollars per album.

Shattered Windows⁶⁷

Hollywood, meanwhile, long relied on a rigid⁶⁸ “windowing” system where films played exclusively⁶⁹ in cinemas for months before moving to home release⁷⁰. Streaming disrupted this, but the COVID-19 pandemic shattered it completely. With cinemas closed, studios embraced⁷¹ “Day-and-Date” releases, launching films online and in theatres simultaneously⁷².

Even after restrictions were lifted⁷³, the old window never fully returned. By 2024, many films hit streaming platforms within 30–45 days, angering⁷⁴ actors whose contracts depended on⁷⁵ long theatre runs⁷⁶. In 2021, Scarlett Johansson sued⁷⁷ Disney over *Black Widow*, arguing that the film’s simultaneous online release reduced her box-office⁷⁸ bonuses. The case⁷⁹ was settled⁸⁰ privately.

This type of disruption soon widened into one of Hollywood’s largest labour⁸¹ disputes⁸². In the broadcast⁸³ era, actors and writers relied on residuals⁸⁴ from re-runs⁸⁵. Streaming erased⁸⁶ re-runs entirely: shows simply sit in digital libraries, generating only token⁸⁷ residuals. A major 2023 strike settlement⁸⁸ introduced new formulas such as a “Subscriber Factor” and a

“Success Bonus” tied⁸⁹ to how widely a title is viewed. Crucially⁹⁰, platforms were forced to reveal⁹¹ viewing data⁹² long kept secret, opening the “black box⁹³” of streaming economics.

Mind Games

Streaming has reshaped⁹⁴ not only the business but the psychology of viewing. Features⁹⁵ like “Post-Play” remove natural pauses, encouraging binge-watching⁹⁶, a behaviour researchers⁹⁷ link to stress relief⁹⁸ and escapism⁹⁹. Algorithms now classify users¹⁰⁰ into “Taste Communities¹⁰¹” based entirely on viewing behaviour, helping niche titles like the Korean show *Squid Game* find global audiences.

Now, in the mid-2020s, streaming’s explosive growth has begun to slow. “Subscription fatigue¹⁰²” has set in¹⁰³, and many users have become “Serial Churners¹⁰⁴,” subscribing for a month to watch a single show before cancelling. In response¹⁰⁵, companies began “rebundling¹⁰⁶”: combining internet and streaming packages¹⁰⁷ through broadband providers¹⁰⁸ and offering cheaper, ad-supported¹⁰⁹ tiers. In 2024, 40 percent of new Netflix users chose an ad-supported plan, showing that

the market was circling back toward older television models.

Creators¹¹⁰ are also adapting to changing attention¹¹¹ habits¹¹². Many viewers now watch while scrolling¹¹³ on their phones, pushing writers toward simpler plots¹¹⁴, clearer emotional beats¹¹⁵, and more regular exposition¹¹⁶ so distracted¹¹⁷ viewers can keep up¹¹⁸. Directors¹¹⁹ report adding stronger visual cues¹²⁰ and faster tonal shifts¹²¹ because analytics¹²² show exactly where audiences stop watching. This “attention economy” hasn’t removed artistic ambition, but it has pushed the industry toward sharper openings¹²³, quicker hooks¹²⁴, and dialogue that survives¹²⁵ half-focused viewing.

So, are you still watching? The future of the content we stream may just depend on your answer.

Stream Smarter

While the algorithms are designed to keep you passive, a few insider tricks¹ can help you take back control of your entertainment queue².

• **The Secret Menu:** Netflix organises its vast³ library into thousands of specific micro-genres that aren’t always listed on the homepage⁴. By typing *netflix.com/browse/genre/* followed by a specific code into your browser⁵, you can bypass⁶ the algorithm. Try 8711 for Horror Movies, 1365 for Action & Adventure, or 7424 for Anime.

• **Fix Your Flow:** If your music playlist feels disjointed⁷, dive into your Spotify settings⁸ and enable “Crossfade.” Setting this to between 6 and 12 seconds creates a seamless⁹, DJ-style transition between tracks¹⁰, eliminating awkward¹¹ silence and keeping the energy consistent¹².

• **Algorithm Amnesia:** We all have that one guilty pleasure¹³ reality show we watched once but don’t want haunting¹⁴ our “Recommended for You” list forever. On Netflix, navigate to “Account” > “Profile & Parental Controls¹⁵” > “Viewing Activity.” From there, you can delete¹⁶ individual titles to effectively tell the algorithm to forget your temporary¹⁷ lapse in taste¹⁸.

INFOBOX

The Business of War

As **dreadful**¹ as war is, it is also big business, and current conflicts around the world are **boosting**² the profits in an already massive global market. We explore how the **arms trade**³ functions.

First, let's **get a handle on**⁴ the scale of the market. An extremely useful **data source**⁵ is the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI), which **estimated**⁶ that in 2022, the global value of the arms trade was at least USD 138 bln, although **suspected**⁷ to be much more.

Their **fact file**⁸, *Trends in Arms Transfers 2024*, was also highly informative. It **revealed**⁹ that:

Between 2020 – 2024, the United States was **by far**¹⁰ the largest arms exporter with 43 percent **market share**¹¹. France was second with 9.6, followed by Russia, China, and Germany with 7.8, 5.9, and 5.6 percent, respectively. However, it should be noted that Russia's export share has fallen **sharply**¹² (some estimates show a 63 percent **drop**¹³ in its exports between 2015 and 2024) **due to**¹⁴ the war, sanctions and

production **redirected**¹⁵ to its own **war effort**¹⁶.

Between 2015-19 and 2020-24, American arms exports rose by 21 percent.

In 2024, global military **expenditure**¹⁷ reached USD 2.72 tln, a 9.4 percent increase compared with 2023, the largest **annual**¹⁸ rise since the end of the Cold War. The reason that **figure**¹⁹ is so much higher than exports is that it includes **domestic**²⁰ expenditure – e.g., countries making and **supplying**²¹ their own weapons.

The United States' USD 997 bln (5.7 percent growth) **accounts for**²² 37 percent of global military spending. China's **defence outlay**²³ was around USD 314 bln.

INFOBOX

THE UKRAINIAN BATTLEFIELD HAS BECOME A GLOBAL SHOWCASE FOR A WIDE RANGE OF SUPPLIERS.

Russia's spending **surged**²⁴ 38 percent to about USD 149 bln, around 7.1 percent of its **GDP**²⁵.

Between 2020-2024, the top arms-importing country was Ukraine (8.8 percent), followed by India, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and Pakistan (8.3, 6.8, 6.8, 4.6 percent).

The Ukraine War, Rising Spending – A Windfall²⁶ for Weapons Producers²⁷

The invasion of Ukraine by Russia in February 2022 has had a **major impact**²⁸ on military budgets and **procurement**²⁹. In 2024, Ukraine's military spending was estimated at USD 64.7 bln, representing about 34 percent of its GDP – the highest **military burden**³⁰ of any country that year. It should also be noted that this figure does not include **military aid**³¹ for the same year of around USD 60 bln.

After years of **complacent**³² **slumber**³³, NATO and European states have **hiked up**³⁴ their own military expenditure **allocations**³⁵. In Europe (including Russia), military spending rose 17 percent in 2024. **Under pressure**³⁶ from United States President Trump, in 2025, NATO **members**³⁷ **committed**³⁸ to increasing security-related budgets to up to five percent of GDP by 2035. Many EU countries and the UK have made similar **undertakings**³⁹.

Other Big Spenders⁴⁰

Outside Europe, **defence budgets**⁴¹ are climbing sharply across the Middle East and South Asia.

Saudi Arabia was the world's fifth-largest military spender in 2023, at around USD 75 bln. Its high outlay **reflects**⁴² **tensions**⁴³ with Iran and **involvement**⁴⁴ in Yemen, as well as a **desire**⁴⁵ to secure **oil facilities**⁴⁶. The main **suppliers**⁴⁷ are Lockheed Martin, Boeing, RTX, and Britain's BAE Systems, which **maintains**⁴⁸ **extensive**⁴⁹ contracts including the Typhoon **jet**⁵⁰. Riyadh also aims to localise half its defence procurement by 2030 through Saudi Arabian Military Industries (SAMI).

Qatar, meanwhile, increased spending sharply after the 2017 regional blockade. Its imports from France, the UK, and the USA include Rafale and Typhoon **aircraft**⁵¹.

Pakistan spent about USD 10 bln, around 3.7 percent of GDP, largely **driven**⁵² by rivalry with India and **internal security**⁵³ needs. Its main suppliers are China, through firms such as NORINCO and AVIC, with additional imports from Turkey and the United States.

In East Asia, Japan, long **constrained**⁵⁴ by its **post-war**⁵⁵ pacifist constitution, **proved**⁵⁶ a record USD 51 bln defence budget for 2024, part of a plan to double military expenditure to two percent of GDP by 2027. The move reflects **concerns**⁵⁷ over China's military expansion, North Korea's **missile tests**⁵⁸ and the security of **sea lanes**⁵⁹ around Taiwan. Tokyo is investing heavily in missile defence, cybersecurity and **long-range strike**⁶⁰ **capability**⁶¹, and is **co-developing**⁶² a next-generation **fighter jet**⁶³ with the UK and Italy under the Global Combat Air Programme (GCAP).

South Korea, **facing**⁶⁴ a **nuclear-armed**⁶⁵ North and a **volatile**⁶⁶ **regional environment**⁶⁷, allocated about USD 50 bln to protecting itself in 2024, **roughly**⁶⁸ 2.7 percent of GDP. It maintains one of the world's largest **standing armies**⁶⁹ and is becoming a major arms exporter **in its own right**⁷⁰, supplying tanks, artillery, and fighter jets to Europe, the Middle East and Southeast Asia. Seoul's growing industry, led by firms like Hanwha Aerospace and Korea Aerospace Industries, reflects a shift from **dependence**⁷¹ on American **equipment**⁷² towards building a **self-sustaining**⁷³, export-driven defence sector.

Leading Suppliers

While several countries are looking to become more **self-sufficient**⁷⁴ in military production, a few major players **rule the roost**⁷⁵. (see Table 1)

Many of the largest companies and leading export countries are **engaged in**⁷⁶ producing **big-ticket**⁷⁷ **items**⁷⁸ such as fighter jets and **battleships**⁷⁹. For example, USA firms have **on order**⁸⁰ 996 combat aircraft, 342 combat helicopters, 7 **warships**⁸¹, 41 **surface-to-air missile systems**⁸² (SAM), 403 **tanks**⁸³ and 1,706 **armoured vehicles**⁸⁴.

Changing Procurement Trends

However, as the nature of war changes, a different class of weapon is **entering the fray**⁸⁵. **Outgunned**⁸⁶ by a larger adversary, the Ukrainian **military forces**⁸⁷ have had to **think outside the box**⁸⁸ by relying less on expensive **hardware**⁸⁹ and more on **low-budget**⁹⁰, but effective **weaponry**⁹¹.

The Ukrainian production of drones **reportedly**⁹² increased **tenfold**⁹³ during 2024: from about 20,000 **units**⁹⁴ to over 200,000 per month. **Unmanned**⁹⁵ systems reportedly accounted for nearly half of all Russian vehicle or artillery losses in January 2025.

Consequently, the Ukrainian **battlefield**⁹⁶ has become a global **showcase**⁹⁷ for a **wide range**⁹⁸ of suppliers. Prominent foreign **manufacturers**⁹⁹ include Turkey's Baykar, maker of the TB2 tactical strike drone that saw heavy use early in the war and remains a **high-profile**¹⁰⁰ export success for Ankara. Baykar has expanded capacity and invested in **indigenous**¹⁰¹ engines as it **scales**¹⁰² exports.

Russia has relied heavily on Iranian designs such as the Shahed family of **loitering munitions**¹⁰³. Meanwhile, Russian manufacturers, notably ZALA Aero (Kalashnikov group) and the Kronshtadt Group (Orion family), produce domestically designed loitering munitions and MALE (**medium-altitude**¹⁰⁴, **long-endurance**¹⁰⁵) drones that have been **fielded**¹⁰⁶ alongside simpler kamikaze types. Smaller producers include Ukrainian companies such as Ukrspesystems and Aerorozvidka, and the Polish WB Group, which provides the Warmate loitering munition.

How Deals Are Done

The global arms industry¹⁰⁷ operates through a complex mix of government policy¹⁰⁸, diplomacy and corporate salesmanship¹⁰⁹. Unlike most sectors, defence deals are rarely¹¹⁰ open-market¹¹¹ transactions. Because weapons exports affect¹¹² national security¹¹³ and foreign policy¹¹⁴, they are closely regulated and often negotiated government-to-government, either directly or with manufacturers acting under licence.

Major contracts usually begin with defence attachés¹¹⁵, official delegations or state visits¹¹⁶. When the buyer is a national government, the seller is typically another state or a company authorised¹¹⁷ by it. In the United States, for example, many exports are handled through¹¹⁸ the Foreign Military Sales (FMS) programme, in which the US Department of Defense acts as broker¹¹⁹ between an American manufacturer and the purchasing country. Elsewhere, countries such as France or the UK may allow their defence companies to deal directly, but under export approval from their respective governments.

A key meeting point¹²⁰ for buyers and sellers is the international defence exhibition¹²¹ circuit¹²². The biggest events include the Farnborough International Airshow in the UK, Eurosatory in Paris, IDEX in Abu Dhabi, and DSEI (Defence and Security Equipment International) in London. These shows attract military delegations from over 100 countries and feature¹²³ everything from tanks and missiles to cybersecurity tools. Contracts are often announced¹²⁴ during such events, but most negotiations occur¹²⁵ privately, months or years in advance¹²⁶.

Today, the process increasingly involves offset agreements¹²⁷ – arrangements requiring¹²⁸ suppliers to reinvest part of a contract's value in the buyer's economy, often through technology transfer¹²⁹ or local assembly¹³⁰.

Beyond formal trade fairs¹³¹, arms dealers¹³² and brokers play an important behind-the-scenes role¹³³. Some act as intermediaries¹³⁴ for governments lacking¹³⁵ diplomatic access or technical expertise¹³⁶, arranging financing, logistics or end-user¹³⁷ certification. This part of the business is controversial: middlemen¹³⁸ have historically been involved in illicit¹³⁹ or grey-area¹⁴⁰ sales, prompting¹⁴¹ tighter international rules such as the UN Arms Trade Treaty¹⁴² (2014), which seeks to prevent weapons from reaching embargoed¹⁴³ states or terrorist groups.

A Logistics Challenge¹⁴⁴

Understandably, moving weapons and munitions¹⁴⁵ around the globe requires considerable care¹⁴⁶ and planning. How do they get from the factory floor to the battlefield?

1. Production and Preparation

- Weapons and munitions are completed, tested and certified at defence plants¹⁴⁷ before shipment¹⁴⁸.
- Each item receives documentation for export control, serial tracking¹⁴⁹ and, if required, secrecy classification¹⁵⁰.

Packaging depends on the type:

- Small arms and ammunition: sealed crates¹⁵¹ or ISO containers¹⁵².
- Missiles and precision systems: shock-proof¹⁵³, climate-controlled cases.
- Vehicles, aircraft and artillery: heavy-lift trailers¹⁵⁴ or modular shipping frames¹⁵⁵.

2. Domestic Transport to Port or Airbase

- Cargo travels by secure road or rail under armed escort.

- Movements are logged in a **chain-of-custody**¹⁵⁶ system to prevent **tampering**¹⁵⁷ or diversion.
- **Hazardous**¹⁵⁸ or explosive loads (e.g., **propellants**¹⁵⁹, **warheads**¹⁶⁰) follow special safety routes and timing regulations.

3. International Shipping or **Airlift**¹⁶¹

- Sea freight handles most heavy equipment using roll-on/roll-off (Ro-Ro) **vessels**¹⁶² or **flat-deck carriers**¹⁶³.
- Airlift (military C-17s, Il-76s, or chartered freighters) is reserved for **urgent**¹⁶⁴ or high-value **deliveries**¹⁶⁵.
- Sensitive electronics or **classified**¹⁶⁶ parts are sometimes hand-carried by courier or shipped separately **under armed guard**¹⁶⁷.

4. **Customs**¹⁶⁸ and **Handover**¹⁶⁹

- Every **consignment**¹⁷⁰ must have an **export licence**¹⁷¹, an end-user certificate and **customs clearance**¹⁷² at entry.
- Receiving states often **undergo**¹⁷³ inspection or verification before the transfer is finalised.
- At this stage, **ownership**¹⁷⁴ formally passes from supplier to buyer, usually government-to-government.

5. Distribution Within the Country

- Shipments move from ports or airbases to central **depots**¹⁷⁵ or arsenals for **storage**¹⁷⁶ and **inventory checks**¹⁷⁷.
- Ammunition is stored in separate, **blast-protected**¹⁷⁸ magazines.
- Equipment earmarked for **combat units**¹⁷⁹ is transported by secure convoy or tactical airlift to forward bases.

6. **Deployment**¹⁸⁰ and **Sustainment**¹⁸¹

- Once in **theatre**¹⁸², local logistics units handle **refuelling**¹⁸³, repairs and **resupply**¹⁸⁴.
- **Follow-on**¹⁸⁵ shipments of **spares**¹⁸⁶, **replacement parts**¹⁸⁷ and munitions maintain readiness.
- **Disruption**¹⁸⁸ – from damaged infrastructure, **port congestion**¹⁸⁹, or airspace restrictions can **delay**¹⁹⁰ delivery and limit combat effectiveness.

The Battle Continues

Modern arms trading involves a complex **web of alliances**¹⁹¹, **trade missions**¹⁹², multimillion-dollar investments in **research**¹⁹³ and product development, **supply chains**¹⁹⁴ to service what seems to be an **insatiable demand**¹⁹⁵. Whether it is the **pursuit**¹⁹⁶ or prevention of war as the primary **driving factor**¹⁹⁷, future **forecasts**¹⁹⁸ suggest arms production is only moving in one direction.

Weapons Terms

- **Loitering munitions** – expendable unmanned weapons that can circle over an area, identify a target, and then **dive in**¹ to destroy it, combining **surveillance**² and strike in one system.
- **Kamikaze drones** – an informal term for loitering munitions or improvised attack drones that **deliberately**³ crash into their targets and are destroyed on impact.
- **Hard kill** – a **defensive measure**⁴ that physically destroys or **intercepts**⁵ an **incoming threat**⁶ (such as a missile or drone), as opposed to “soft kill” methods like **jamming**⁷ or **deception**⁸.
- **Magazine** – In military and defence logistics, a specialised storage facility for ammunition or explosives, designed with blast walls, safety distances, and ventilation to prevent accidental detonation

Crash-Landing¹: The Turbulence² Hitting Small Airlines³

These days, reserving a flight online is as simple, and often as cheap as booking train or bus tickets, but that's making it challenging for some operators to remain **airborne**⁴.

Chaos has **erupted**⁵ in the skies, and not **due to**⁶ **air-traffic controllers**⁷ striking. Over the past 18 months, several smaller and one or two larger airlines have either **grounded**⁸ their fleets or **filed for bankruptcy**⁹, leaving passengers **stranded**¹⁰ and investors shaken. Just take a look at the **carnage**¹¹:

• May 2024 – Qantas Airways (Australia) – **Suspended**¹² its Shanghai–Sydney route as part of broader Asia-network **trimming**¹³.

- January 2025 – airBaltic (Latvia) – Suspended 19 routes, reduced **frequencies**¹⁴ on 21 others and **cancelled**¹⁵ 4,670 flights (67,000 passengers **affected**¹⁶).
- February 2025 – Bees Airlines (Romania) – Had its Air Operator Certificate **revoked**¹⁷ after suspending operations in December 2024.
- April 2025 – Air Belgium (Belgium) – Declared bankrupt after **ceasing**¹⁸ **scheduled**¹⁹ passenger operations in October 2023 and shifting focus to **cargo**²⁰.

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- August 2025 – Spirit Airlines (USA) – Filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection and **announced**²¹ **major**²² route reductions, cutting 11 cities starting 2 October.
- August 2025 – Ravn Alaska (USA) – Ceased all flights in Alaska **abruptly**²³.
 - Mid-2025 (announced) – PLAY (Iceland) – Cancelled multiple US services (e.g., New York Stewart, Boston, Baltimore) ahead of its **collapse**²⁴.
- September 2025 – PLAY (Iceland) – Abruptly ceased all operations and filed for bankruptcy, cancelling all flights.
- September 2025 – Braathens International Airways (Sweden) – Filed for bankruptcy of its Airbus charter operations, ceasing flights under that **division**²⁵. ATR72 operations continued.
- September 2025 – Wizz Air (Europe/Middle East, Abu Dhabi JV) – Suspended operations of Abu Dhabi joint venture. By the end of October 30 routes were affected.
- October 2025 – Ryanair (Europe) – Announced cancellation of 24 routes and over 800,000 seats in its German winter schedule.

Code Sharing

Code-sharing is a **partnership**¹ between airlines that allows them to share the same flight. One airline operates the aircraft, while the other sells seats under their own flight numbers. This helps smaller carriers cut costs, extend their networks, and attract more passengers without adding new aircraft. The flight itself is operated by just one airline.

The **spate**²⁶ of **failures**²⁷ and cancelled routes raises a worrying question: have **low-cost airlines**²⁸ reached their **final destination**²⁹, or is this **merely**³⁰ a **bout**³¹ of **rough air**³² in an industry known for **volatility**³³?

The Fragile³⁴ Economics of Flying

The airline industry has always operated on **wafer-thin**³⁵ **margins**³⁶, but for smaller and budget **carriers**³⁷, that margin has now all but **vanished**³⁸. Fuel, which typically **accounts for**³⁹ 25-35 percent of **operating costs**⁴⁰, has **soared**⁴¹ in price over the past year. This **surge**⁴², driven by global **supply**⁴³ **disruptions**⁴⁴ and **carbon taxes**⁴⁵, has hit smaller operators hardest. **Unlike**⁴⁶ the major airlines, they **lack**⁴⁷ the **financial muscle**⁴⁸ to **hedge**⁴⁹ fuel prices or absorb cost **spikes**⁵⁰.

Leasing costs⁵¹ have also **shot up**⁵². Many regional and start-up airlines do not own their planes but lease them from international **lessors**⁵³, often in US dollars. With **interest rates**⁵⁴ remaining high and the dollar strong, **repayments**⁵⁵ have become increasingly expensive. For carriers such as Play and Braathens, whose **revenues**⁵⁶ are **primarily**⁵⁷ in weaker European **currencies**⁵⁸, the maths simply stopped working.

Air Belgium's collapse, meanwhile, **highlights**⁵⁹ another structural **weakness**⁶⁰. It had tried to balance passenger and cargo operations to **spread**⁶¹ risk, but slower global trade and weak **freight demand**⁶² left the company with **underused**⁶³ **aircraft**⁶⁴ and

mounting⁶⁵ debts⁶⁶. Ravn Alaska, which depended heavily on regional routes and local tourism, suffered from reduced passenger numbers and higher maintenance costs⁶⁷ in remote⁶⁸ locations.

Shifting Passenger Behaviour

The low-cost model depends on full planes, fast turnarounds⁶⁹ and steady demand. But since the pandemic, travel habits⁷⁰ have changed. Passengers are booking later, flying less frequently⁷¹, and are more likely to choose direct routes⁷² with trusted⁷³ operators. Business travel, once a reliable⁷⁴ filler⁷⁵ of midweek⁷⁶ seats, has not recovered to pre-2020 levels, as hybrid working remains entrenched⁷⁷.

- Later bookings: Passengers are booking closer to departure⁷⁸, with over 60 percent of bookings happening online within 0–7 days for some markets (FCM Travel Hub, 2025).
- Business travel still below pre-pandemic levels: Global business travel spending in 2023 was 93 percent of 2019 levels; international trips⁷⁹ are further behind at 79 percent (Global Business Travel Association – GBTA, 2023).
- Load factors⁸⁰ remain crucial: Global airline load factor was 85.2 percent in August 2024; North America reached 88.2 percent (International Association of Travel Agents – IATA, 2024).
- Shift to trusted direct routes: Airlines report that passengers increasingly prefer reliable, direct flights, reducing the fill on secondary or connecting routes⁸¹ (International Airlines Group – IAG, 2024).

At the same time, leisure travellers⁸² are showing signs of fatigue⁸³ with “ultra-low-cost” flying. Hidden fees⁸⁴, cramped seats⁸⁵, and long delays⁸⁶ have eroded some of the goodwill⁸⁷ that once fuelled the budget boom. Many consumers are now prepared to pay a little more for comfort and reliability⁸⁸, particularly after a spate of cancellations and stranded passengers in recent months⁸⁹.

Wizz Air’s decision to cut back on⁹⁰ several routes across Central and Eastern Europe

illustrates this shift. Routes that were profitable⁹¹ when aircraft were full during the summer are now loss-making in the off-season⁹². Fewer passengers and higher costs have made it difficult to justify⁹³ serving⁹⁴ marginal destinations.

Environmental⁹⁵ and Regulatory⁹⁶ Headwinds⁹⁷

Growing environmental scrutiny⁹⁸ is also creating major challenges for airlines. European regulators are tightening⁹⁹ emissions targets, and some countries are introducing taxes or banning¹⁰⁰ short-haul flights¹⁰¹ where rail¹⁰² alternatives exist, hitting the core business¹⁰³ of small and regional carriers. Sustainability¹⁰⁴ pressures are reshaping expectations¹⁰⁵, with criticism over carbon footprints¹⁰⁶ and greenwashing¹⁰⁷. Meeting environmental goals¹⁰⁸ requires costly investment in newer aircraft or sustainable fuels, often out of reach¹⁰⁹ for smaller operators.

Even **surviving**¹¹⁰ airlines face limited airport access. **Major hubs**¹¹¹ prioritise **established**¹¹² carriers, leaving smaller players on the edges of **timetables**¹¹³, losing prime departure times and **connecting traffic**¹¹⁴ essential for profitability.

Large airlines can **cross-subsidise**¹¹⁵ weaker routes, share risks **via**¹¹⁶ alliances, access cheaper finance and negotiate better with **suppliers**¹¹⁷ and airports. The **budget**¹¹⁸ carriers' old formula of cutting extras and costs is **under strain**¹¹⁹. Rising **labour costs**¹²⁰, expensive maintenance and **supply chain**¹²¹ delays, combined with intense **competition**¹²², have pushed **fares**¹²³ down to **unsustainable**¹²⁴ levels. Any disruption in fuel, finance or demand can quickly ground smaller operators.

Surviving airlines have acted **cautiously**¹²⁵. Low-cost carriers like Ryanair and easyJet focus on efficiency and selective expansion, investing in fleet management systems. Qantas has **withdrawn**¹²⁶ from some long-haul and unprofitable regional routes. Others are exploring **code-sharing**¹²⁷ (See Fact Box) or **partial**¹²⁸ **mergers**¹²⁹ to reduce duplication and costs. Investors, once attracted to rapid expansion, now demand **prudence**¹³⁰ and environmental **accountability**¹³¹.

Recent collapses have caused real disruption. Thousands have been stranded or forced onto more expensive carriers. Even where passengers are **insured**¹³², trust in smaller airlines is damaged, creating a **feedback loop**¹³³. **Wary**¹³⁴ passengers reduce load factors, raising the risk of further failures. In this industry, reputation is a sensitive **wind vane**¹³⁵ that **tips**¹³⁶ the direction of **balance sheets**¹³⁷.

The current turbulence is not so much a **one-off**¹³⁸ storm as a **market correction**¹³⁹. The rapid expansion of the 2010s, with **over-leveraged**¹⁴⁰ low-cost carriers selling **underpriced**¹⁴¹ tickets and betting on rapid and **persistent**¹⁴² growth, was never sustainable. As a result, we are likely to see fewer but stronger airlines, operating more realistically.

While the appetite for **affordable**¹⁴³ travel is likely to remain strong among younger and price-sensitive passengers, budget operators' business models may need to evolve, resulting in higher fares, fewer **fringe**¹⁴⁴ destinations and greater focus on reliability and sustainability.

Final¹⁴⁵ Approach¹⁴⁶

The **flightpaths**¹⁴⁷ are still busy, but the **free-for-all**¹⁴⁸ era of budget flying is **fading over the horizon**¹⁴⁹. Rising costs, shifting passenger priorities and environmental **obligations**¹⁵⁰ have grounded the weakest operators. Those that remain will need to **clip their wings**¹⁵¹.

For travellers, this may mean fewer options and slightly higher prices. For the industry, it means a necessary recalibration – trimming the **excesses**¹⁵² of the past decade and building a more stable, if less **exuberant**¹⁵³, future. The market is **descending**¹⁵⁴ towards financial **terra firma**¹⁵⁵ – though expect some continued turbulence and **bumpy rides**¹⁵⁶ for passengers on the way down.

Social Enterprise Business Model

It operates like a traditional company but reinvests most profits into **fulfilling**¹ its mission, such as reducing **poverty**², improving health, or protecting the **environment**³. Unlike **charities**⁴, social enterprises earn income through trading, not donations, and unlike regular businesses, their main aim is to make a positive impact rather than maximise **shareholder**⁵ **returns**⁶.

For many travellers in Asia, the tuk-tuk is more than just a **quirky**² three-wheeled **mode of transport**³; it is a cultural icon. These **buzzing**⁴, **brightly painted**⁵ auto-rickshaws are synonymous with chaotic **city traffic**⁶, **narrow**⁷ **village lanes**⁸ and the **thrilling**⁹ **unpredictability**¹⁰ of local travel. But now, thanks to a **bold**¹¹ and imaginative business idea, the **humble**¹² tuk-tuk has been **reinvented**¹³, changing the tourist's role from passenger to driver.

Enter TukTuk **Rental**¹⁴, a Sri Lanka-based business that **allows** tourists to **take the wheel**¹⁵ – **literally**¹⁷ – and drive their own tuk-tuk through the island's jungles, coastlines, **mountain passes**¹⁸ and **bustling**¹⁹ towns. The man behind the idea is Thomas Cornish, an Australian **civil engineer**²⁰

immersive and adventurous alternative: putting the traveller in the driver's seat, quite literally, of their Asian experience.

The concept is simple but brilliant. Tourists hire a tuk-tuk for several days or weeks, receive a special local [driving permit](#)²⁶, and get a [crash course](#)²⁷ ([figuratively speaking](#)²⁸) in how to operate the vehicle. Then, with a map in hand (or more likely, smartphone GPS), they set off [on their own](#)²⁹ to explore Sri Lanka's less-travelled roads. For many, it's the perfect [blend](#)³⁰ of independence and authentic [cultural engagement](#)³¹.

The idea has [struck a chord](#)³² with modern tourists looking for deeper experiences and [meaningful](#)³³ travel. No longer satisfied with passive [sightseeing](#)³⁴, today's travellers want interaction, spontaneity and the freedom to [roam](#)³⁵. A tuk-tuk offers all of this. It's small enough to [navigate](#)³⁶ [rural backroads](#)³⁷, open enough to smell the spices [wafting from](#)³⁸ [roadside](#)³⁹ kitchens, and [eye-catching](#)⁴⁰ enough to make friends everywhere you stop.

All the same⁴⁹, this is not a venture⁵⁰ for the faint-hearted⁵¹. Driving in Sri Lanka, or indeed, in many parts of South and Southeast Asia, requires a steady nerve⁵² and a lot of patience⁵³. Traffic can be unpredictable, signage⁵⁴ minimal, and the local driving style haphazard and enthusiastic. But for those willing to⁵⁵ adapt, the rewards are considerable⁵⁶. Customers describe the experience as liberating⁵⁷, hilarious⁵⁸ and unforgettable⁵⁹, from winding through⁶⁰ tea plantations and greeting villagers along the way⁶¹, to camping on remote⁶² beaches or discovering roadside eateries⁶³ tourists would never otherwise find.

One of the cleverest aspects of the business model is that it empowers⁶⁴ not just travellers, but locals, too. TukTuk Rental endeavours⁶⁵ to work on the social enterprise⁶⁶ model (See Fact Box) and defined by the company's strapline⁶⁷ – "Travel like a local. Support the Community⁶⁸." Many of the tuk-tuks are owned by local drivers who lease⁶⁹ them to the company when not in use. This creates a new source of income⁷⁰ for them and supports local families. Moreover, a portion of the profits is invested in community projects, sustainability⁷¹ initiatives and road safety campaigns, which is all part of a broader commitment⁷² to responsible and sustainable tourism.

Building on the success in Sri Lanka, the business has now expanded into Cambodia, another country where tuk-tuks are part of the cultural fabric⁷³. It is quickly becoming popular with younger tourists, digital nomads⁷⁴ and couples⁷⁵ seeking unique honeymoon⁷⁶ alternatives.

From a business perspective, Cornish's venture offers a textbook case⁷⁷ of how identifying an overlooked⁷⁸ niche can create a scalable⁷⁹, cross-border⁸⁰ opportunity. His background⁸¹ as an engineer likely contributed to the structured yet practical approach to operations by securing⁸² legal permits for foreign drivers, offering training and safety advice, and ensuring⁸³ roadside support. These systems make the experience not only possible but also reliable⁸⁴, repeatable⁸⁵ and, crucially⁸⁶, safe.

The brand has also benefited from viral word-of-mouth⁸⁷ and strong online storytelling⁸⁸. Social media is peppered⁸⁹ with videos

of intrepid⁹⁰ travellers navigating their colourful tuk-tuks down winding⁹¹ roads, waving to laughing schoolchildren and describing the adventure of a lifetime. These organic⁹² endorsements⁹³ are invaluable⁹⁴, creating a buzz⁹⁵ that traditional advertising⁹⁶ could never match⁹⁷.

Looking ahead, there's scope⁹⁸ for further expansion into countries like Thailand, Vietnam and the Philippines – all of which have strong tuk-tuk cultures and growing tourist demand⁹⁹. The model could also inspire similar ventures in other parts of the world using different iconic vehicles, campervans¹⁰⁰ in New Zealand, Citroën 2CVs in France, or even Trabants in Central and Eastern Europe.

Ultimately¹⁰¹, TukTuk Rental taps into¹⁰² something fundamental: the human desire for freedom, discovery and connection. In an age of package holidays¹⁰³ and experiences handed on a plate¹⁰⁴, taking the controls of a tuk-tuk offers a rare¹⁰⁵ sense of agency¹⁰⁶ and spontaneity. It's a small vehicle, but it opens up a world of experience.

In enterprise terms, it proves that, with a little imagination, the next great business idea might be right under your nose.

Are Meal Delivery Services¹ Worth It?

If you live in a **block of flats**² and get up early, you might have noticed meal delivery packages on your **neighbour's**³ **doorstep**⁴. Is it a smart move, or are they **paying through the nose**⁵ for **ingredients**⁶ they could easily buy more cheaply in a shop?

In recent years, meal delivery services have exploded onto the consumer scene, offering **busy**⁷ **households**⁸ and **health-conscious**⁹ individuals a **seemingly**¹⁰ perfect **solution**¹¹ to the **age-old**¹² problem: what's for dinner?

Whether trying to lose weight, eat more healthily, or just avoid another tiresome and time-consuming trip to the supermarket, meal delivery kits look to **tick all the boxes**¹³. As new customers **flock**¹⁴ to **order**¹⁵, there are now **numerous**¹⁶

providers¹⁷ servicing this growing trend. (see *Providers and Popularity Fact Box*).

The Rise of the Meal Kit Industry

Meal delivery services are not an entirely new concept. For decades, companies like Weight Watchers have offered **pre-packaged**¹⁸, calorie-controlled meals for delivery, primarily focused on **weight loss**¹⁹.

But the modern **iteration**²⁰, offering fresh ingredients and recipes to cook at home, first **gained traction**²¹ around 2012, with companies like Blue Apron pioneering the model in the United States.

These services typically provide weekly deliveries of pre-portioned ingredients and **easy-to-follow**²² recipe cards. Some, like HelloFresh and Marley Spoon, focus on **gourmet**²³ or family-friendly options, while others like Freshly and Factor deliver fully-prepared meals that only

need **heating**²⁴. Companies such as Daily Harvest specialise in **plant-based**²⁵, **frozen**²⁶ meal options, smoothies and soups.

The industry received an unexpected **boost**²⁷ during the COVID-19 pandemic, when lockdowns and social distancing made traditional **grocery shopping**²⁸ more challenging. Consumers turned to meal kits not only for **convenience**²⁹ but

for safety and comfort, creating a **surge in demand**³⁰ that many providers were **barely**³¹ able to **keep up with**³².

According to a report by Statista, the global meal kit market size reached over USD 15 bln in 2021 and is projected to **surpass**³³ USD 30 bln by 2028, with **double-digit**³⁴ **annual**³⁵ growth.

The Appeal: Convenience Meets Health Goals

Delivery services aim to make life easier by removing the **hassle**³⁶ of meal planning, shopping, and portioning. For busy professionals, families with **hectic schedules**³⁷, or those who can't think what to cook each day, these kits are a **compelling**³⁸ solution.

But convenience is only part of the **pitch**³⁹. Many services now emphasise health and weight management, offering low-calorie, **keto**⁴⁰, **paleo**⁴¹, vegetarian and gluten-free options.

Meal delivery services also **boast**⁴² about eliminating **food waste**⁴³. Because ingredients are pre-measured, users are less likely to **overbuy**⁴⁴ at the supermarket or let **perishables**⁴⁵ **rot**⁴⁶ in the **fridge**⁴⁷. For **environmentally aware**⁴⁸ consumers, this

is another **appealing**⁴⁹ **factor**⁵⁰, although some plastic-heavy packaging has drawn criticism.

Do They Help with Weight Loss?

Through calorie counts and portion sizes controlled by the provider, it becomes easier for users to monitor **intake**⁵¹ and avoid **impulse eating**⁵². Many platforms give customers the opportunity to select dietary goals, such as protein and calorie intake. However, the **evidence**⁵³ is mixed.

While structured eating plans with limited choices can help some individuals **stay on track**⁵⁴, they are not **foolproof**⁵⁵. A review by Rumen.com.au **points out**⁵⁶ that weight loss success depends on **consistency**⁵⁷, **exercise**⁵⁸ and personal motivation, factors beyond what a meal kit can provide. Some users report that while meal kits help reduce **snacking**⁵⁹ and promote portion control **in the short term**⁶⁰, they don't necessarily **translate into**⁶¹ **lasting**⁶²

changes. Once the subscription ends, old **habits**⁶³ may return unless broader lifestyle shifts are made.

Additionally, not all meal kits are equally healthy. Some meals, despite being convenient, can be high in sodium, **saturated fats**⁶⁴, or **processed**⁶⁵ ingredients, especially in ready-to-heat versions.

Cost Versus⁶⁶ Convenience

On the face of it⁶⁷, meal delivery services are expensive compared to traditional grocery shopping. Add in **delivery fees**⁶⁸ and subscription **charges**⁶⁹, and the weekly cost can rival or **exceed**⁷⁰ **dining out**⁷¹. However, cost **comparisons**⁷² are not

In the UK, the market has progressively increased over the past 10 years. Key players include:

- HelloFresh UK – a major market leader.
- Gousto – a British meal kit provider offering 75+ recipes weekly.
- Mindful Chef – focuses on healthy, gluten-free, **low-carb**¹ meals.
- Green Chef UK – owned by HelloFresh, specialising in keto and vegan meals.
- SimplyCook – offers **flavour kits**² and recipes rather than full ingredients.
- Allplants – delivers plant-based, pre-cooked frozen meals.
- Prep Kitchen UK – more fitness – and calorie-focused, with **macro**³-balanced options.

Poland

Poland's meal kit market is smaller and has been slower to develop, but is **catching up**⁴ quickly, with a strong emphasis on “catering dietetyczny” – diet-specific catering services.

Popular providers include:

- Maczfit – one of the largest in Poland, offering a wide range of calorie – and diet-specific meal plans.
- Body Chief – fitness-focused, with **tailored**⁵ plans for weight loss, **muscle gain**⁶, etc.
- Catering Dietetyczny LightBox – focuses on health-conscious and portion-controlled meals.
- Fit Apetit – offers trendy, visually appealing, and macro-tracked meals.
- Nice To Fit You (NTFY) – **flexible**⁷ and app-based, with a strong lifestyle branding.

These typically deliver multiple meals per day (often 3–5), boxed in daily bags, not just dinner kits.

straightforward⁷³. Advocates⁷⁴ argue that the price includes not only the ingredients but the planning, shopping, portioning and, in some cases⁷⁵, preparation⁷⁶. For cash-rich⁷⁷, time-poor⁷⁸ professionals, meal delivery services are a good trade-off⁷⁹.

Despite their convenience, a frequent complaint⁸⁰ is a lack of variety⁸¹ or culinary spontaneity. Many users report regimen⁸² fatigue⁸³ after a few months, as menus begin to feel repetitive⁸⁴. The home preparation⁸⁵ aspect may also become boring. While recipe kits offer step-by-step⁸⁶ instructions for those with limited cooking skills, some users may feel like they are assembling furniture⁸⁷ rather than engaging⁸⁸ in any meaningful⁸⁹ culinary creativity.

Are Meal Kits Here to Stay?

Given the market growth projections, the answer is a resounding⁹⁰ 'yes.' The market has also evolved to cater to⁹¹ other potential markets. What began as simple recipe boxes has now expanded into niche services targeting vegans, fitness enthusiasts, gourmet foodies⁹² and even children's lunches. Many brands are leveraging⁹³ AI⁹⁴ and data analytics⁹⁵ to personalise offerings based on previous⁹⁶ orders⁹⁷ or dietary goals.

On the other hand⁹⁸, during tighter⁹⁹ financial times, consumers might revert to¹⁰⁰ traditional cooking as a cheaper alternative, especially in households with more than two people. The weaker¹⁰¹ providers may go under¹⁰² as a consequence, but the market leaders are likely to prevail¹⁰³.

At the End of the Day, Are They Worth It?

The answer depends on who you are and what you value¹⁰⁴. For people seeking structure¹⁰⁵, convenience, or a short-term health kick¹⁰⁶, they can be highly effective. For others, especially those on tight budgets or with a taste for culinary exploration¹⁰⁷, they may fall short¹⁰⁸.



Their appeal lies less in the food itself and more in the lifestyle they support, resulting in time saved, stress reduced, and

choices simplified. For a certain segment of the population, that is more than worth the extra cost.

As the industry continues to innovate and **respond**¹⁰⁹ to changing consumer demands, meal delivery services look here to stay. They will never **replace**¹¹⁰ **home cooking**¹¹¹ or dining out altogether, but they are **carving**¹¹² a **substantial**¹¹³ space through a hybrid model that responds to the demands of modern living. Just remember to watch your step as you **wander out**¹¹⁴ of your **doorway**¹¹⁵ half-asleep in the morning.

Digital Governance¹

Digitisation offers **improved² efficiency³**, speed and economy, but will we pay too high a price in civil liberty and human control?

Governments have always **delegated⁴** tasks, from **tax collection⁵** to **road maintenance⁶**, to specialist agencies. The last two decades, however, have seen a different kind of outsourcing: moving public duties to software and algorithms. Digital governance changes not just how governments deliver services, but how decisions are made, and who, if anyone, is **accountable⁷**.

Digital tools **include⁸** online portals for **permits⁹** and benefits, **national digital identity systems¹⁰**, sensor networks that manage traffic or **utilities¹¹**, and algorithmic systems that **aid¹²**, or sometimes replace, **human judgments¹³**.

Tasks Already Handed Over to¹⁴ Technology

Identity and access. National digital-ID systems now authenticate citizens for banking, **taxes¹⁵**, **healthcare¹⁶** and **voting registration¹⁷**. Estonia's electronic ID and e-Residency are examples of a country built around a digital identity architecture.

India's Aadhaar programme shows that massive digital identity rollouts¹⁸ can reshape¹⁹ public administration overnight²⁰. Introduced in 2009, it assigns²¹ every resident a unique 12-digit number linked to fingerprints²² and iris scans²³, creating the world's largest biometric database. Aadhaar now underpins²⁴ everything from opening a bank account and receiving pensions to subsidised²⁵ food distribution, allowing the government to²⁶ cut duplication²⁷, reduce fraud²⁸, and deliver payments directly to beneficiaries' accounts.

Transactional services. Tax filing, business registration, social-security claims²⁹ and many licensing processes are increasingly³⁰ automated. Citizens file returns³¹ online; governments auto-validate³² documents and trigger³³ payments. Many of these activities can be done through government portals along with personal healthcare, as is the case in Poland.

Infrastructure management. "Smart city" technologies such as traffic sensors³⁴, utility meters³⁵, and waste-collection trackers³⁶ allow municipal managers to optimise resources in near real time. China has invested heavily in such urban platforms, coupling³⁷ sensors and big-data processing to run transport, energy and public-safety systems at scale³⁸.

Black-Box System

In e-government, a black-box system refers to an algorithm or digital process whose internal workings are hidden or too complex for users, including¹ officials, to fully understand. The system takes data in and produces decisions or recommendations, but the reasoning behind those outcomes is opaque.

For example, an AI model might approve² some welfare applications and reject³ others without offering a clear explanation of how it weighed the inputs. This lack of⁴ transparency makes it difficult to audit decisions, challenge errors, or assign accountability.

such as routine legal texts or report summaries are now often assisted by generative tools.

From E-government to AI-government?

Mapping the global leaders in⁴⁷ digital governance, a useful point of reference is the United Nations EGovernment Survey 2024. It **assesses** countries **against**⁴⁸ three criteria:

- Online Services Index (OSI) – the **scope**⁴⁹ and quality of government online services.
- Telecommunications Infrastructure Index (TII) – the status of **digital/ network infrastructure**⁵⁰.
- Human Capital Index (HCI) – education, skills and human-capacity aspects.

Top 10 countries in the 2024 ranking:

- Denmark
- Estonia
- Singapore
- Republic of Korea
- Iceland
- Saudi Arabia
- United Kingdom
- Australia
- Finland
- Netherlands

China and India, while excelling in scale, do not **score highly**⁵¹ across all three criteria and therefore do not make the top 10.



A Natural Evolution?

If this path is a **continuum**⁵², the next logical step is to **hand over the whole shebang**⁵³ of e-government to⁵⁴ AI, but is that even possible, and perhaps more importantly, **desirable**⁵⁵?

Technically, we are well on the way. AI systems are already moving up the decision-making ladder. For example, allocating **student grants**⁵⁶ based on **predictive**⁵⁷ models of success, prioritising applicants for **social housing**⁵⁸ **according to**⁵⁹ need and risk scores, recommending which infrastructure projects should receive limited **municipal funding**⁶⁰, or simulating **budget outcomes**⁶¹ to inform **citywide**⁶² spending plans. In some pilot programmes, algorithms even propose how to distribute **welfare funds**⁶³ or emergency aid, leaving human officials to validate or **adjust**⁶⁴ the machine's recommendations.

Politically, **though**⁶⁵, there is much less appetite, at least in democratic systems and among international institutions, for **ceding**⁶⁶ final, discretionary decisions that

materially affect rights or freedoms to machines. **Apart from**⁶⁷ anything, it is not generally a great **vote-winner**⁶⁸, although the current UK government has **sought to**⁶⁹ link a proposed introduction of digital ID to reducing illegal immigration.

Putting the issue of public support **aside**⁷⁰, the **crux of the matter**⁷¹ **comes down to**⁷² a well-known statement, cited in IBM training material from 1979 and often quoted today:

“A computer can never be held accountable⁷³; therefore, a computer must never make a management decision.”

The maxim lives on because it states the core tension: machines may be excellent at processing⁷⁴ data and selecting optimal choices, but they cannot accept moral or legal responsibility in the way a human official has to.

Future Risks

It seems a no-brainer that⁷⁵ we would not place our future in the hands of a computer to decide, but it is a slippery slope⁷⁶ where changes are often incremental⁷⁷ and almost unnoticeable⁷⁸. What if the autonomous decision-making role of AI were to become greater still?

Handing decisions to algorithms introduces a hornet's nest⁷⁹ of risks that governments, businesses and individuals would have to grapple with⁸⁰:

- The accountability gap⁸¹. If an automated system denies⁸² benefits or triggers enforcement, who answers for an error?
- Bias⁸³ and exclusion. AI models trained on historical data could reproduce past discrimination, entrenching⁸⁴ inequality. When those models are used in hiring, policing, welfare⁸⁵

Big Brother

The term Big Brother originates from George Orwell's 1949 novel *Nineteen Eighty-Four*, where it represents an all-seeing, authoritarian state that constantly monitors its citizens through telescreens and propaganda. The slogan “*Big Brother is watching you*” became a symbol of government surveillance and loss of privacy.

or credit, the social consequences are significant.

- Transparency and legitimacy⁸⁶. Black-box systems (See Fact Box) corrode public trust. Citizens demand understandable rationales⁸⁷ when decisions affect⁸⁸ their lives; opaque models make that hard.
- Security and privacy. Centralised identity databases and sensor networks are attractive targets for theft and abuse⁸⁹. Data breaches⁹⁰ in health or ID systems can have catastrophic personal consequences. In the age of cyberwar and ransomware⁹¹, this is a genuine⁹² current danger.
- Systemic fragility⁹³. Automation scales errors as well as efficiencies. A flawed⁹⁴ ruling applied across millions of transactions can create widespread⁹⁵ harm before humans notice.

Mitigating⁹⁶ the Dangers – A Pragmatic Path Forward

A number of safety valves⁹⁷ are being explored and are likely to include all or many of the following mechanisms:

- Human-in-the-loop⁹⁸ (HITL). Reserve final discretion for humans, while letting AI handle triage⁹⁹, summarisation and low-risk automation.

- **Auditability**¹⁰⁰ and **explainability**¹⁰¹. **Mandate logging**¹⁰², model documentation and **explainable outputs**¹⁰³ so decisions can be reviewed and appealed.
- **Risk-based deployment**¹⁰⁴. Use stronger governance for **higher-stakes**¹⁰⁵ applications (criminal justice, **welfare eligibility**¹⁰⁶) and lighter touch for low-risk automation.
- Open standards and **interoperability**¹⁰⁷. Avoid **vendor lock-in**¹⁰⁸ and create transparent procurement standards so public systems can be inspected and improved.
- Legal and institutional **accountability**¹⁰⁹. Laws and organisational roles must make clear who is responsible when an algorithm harms a citizen, the vendor, the civil servant, or the political officeholder.

Is Digital Governance the Road to Utopia or Dystopia?

Some countries have shown that thoughtful, well-managed citizen-centric design can benefit society without **jeopardising**¹¹⁰ individual freedom or the quality of decision-making. At the other end of the spectrum, China demonstrates the power of massive scale combined with a controlling purpose to use interconnecting technologies such as **surveillance cameras**¹¹¹, digital identities and phone tracking to become a

real-life modern-day Big Brother. (see *Fact Box*).

Fast-forward¹¹² 50 years. What will this conversation look like? Will we laugh at our paranoia as we relax in our smart-city apartments while driverless roadsweepers, managed by a digital city council, clean the streets? Or, will the internet be banned under the censorship of 24/7 surveillance, our every move tracked and recorded, accumulating or losing points on a digital scorecard that determines our access to housing, jobs and even our ability to travel? **Appealing** a decision **to**¹¹³ a computer would be **futile**¹¹⁴.

Your guess on which scenario is more likely will depend on whether you are a techno-optimist or a pessimist, but either way, right now, society **stands at a significant fork in the road**¹¹⁵.

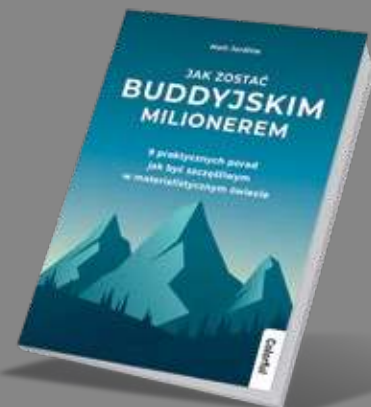

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MBA¹ – A Ticket to Advancement²?

For ambitious professionals, three letters seem to promise a faster **route**³ to the top: MBA. The Master of Business Administration is marketed as a career **accelerator**⁴, a passport to higher **salaries**⁵, and a way to join an international business elite. But how much of that is true, especially in the Polish context? **Paul Martin** **finds out**⁶.

Three Letters, Big Expectations⁷

At its core⁸, an MBA is a postgraduate degree⁹ that teaches broad business management skills¹⁰. Instead of specialising in just one field, students move across finance, accounting¹¹, marketing, operations¹², strategy and leadership¹³.

Classes are usually practical and case study¹⁴ driven. You analyse real companies, work in project teams, and apply¹⁵ theory to business problems. Many programmes add consulting projects, internships¹⁶ or a final “capstone¹⁷” project where you help a real organisation.

For many professionals, especially engineers, IT specialists, lawyers or doctors, an MBA serves as a bridge from expert to manager. It gives you a structured¹⁸ way to understand balance sheets¹⁹, strategy slides²⁰ and people management, not just the technical side of your work. One Polish engineer-turned-executive²¹ described²² it as a way to “put structure” on all the practical and intuitive knowledge²³ he had picked up²⁴ on the job.

The financial argument is hard to ignore, too. In Poland, the potential for salary jumps remains **significant**²⁵, often cited in the 30–50 percent **range**²⁶. However, this **high end**²⁷ is typically realised only when a **graduate**²⁸ strategically **switches**²⁹ employers, **leveraging**³⁰ the degree for a major **external move**³¹. Promotions secured within the same organisation often result in a lower **adjustment**³², generally **capped**³³ around 20 percent.

How Employers in Poland See the MBA

In the 1990s and early 2000s, having **MBA** on your CV in Poland was a **shiny**³⁴, almost exotic **badge**³⁵. For many recruiters, any MBA was impressive. Today, the market has **matured**³⁶, and most senior recruiters will tell you that not all MBAs are **equal**³⁷. The key questions they ask are: *Which school? Which programme? Is it accredited*³⁸ *and recognised*³⁹?

A **generic**⁴⁰, **unknown**⁴¹ programme may add little to your profile. A respected Polish MBA from a well-known business school, or a diploma from a top international institution like INSEAD, LBS, Harvard or Chicago Booth, is a very different story. In those cases, an MBA is often seen as a **clear asset**⁴² and sometimes almost a “**must have**⁴³” for upper management roles.

In some sectors, especially consulting and large corporations, the **absence**⁴⁴ of any MBA at senior level can even **trigger**⁴⁵ the question “Why not?”. At the same time, employers are more critical than before. They look beyond the three letters to the skills, **mindset**⁴⁶ and **experience**⁴⁷ you can demonstrate.

Study at Home?

In Poland, there is a wide choice of **domestic**⁴⁸ programmes. One of the most **reliable**⁴⁹ **quality checks**⁵⁰ is to look for international accreditation. Three main organisations set the **benchmark**⁵¹ here: AMBA (the Association of MBAs), AACSB (the Association to Advance

Collegiate Schools of Business) and EQUIS (the EFMD Quality Improvement System).

Some universities manage to secure all three of these accreditations – the so-called “**triple crown**⁵³”, a **distinction**⁵⁴ achieved by only about one percent of business schools **worldwide**⁵⁵. In Poland, institutions such as Kozminski University (for its Executive MBA) and SGH Warsaw School of Economics have **reached**⁵⁶ this level, signalling that their programmes meet demanding international standards.

Polish rankings are another **useful guide**⁵⁷. The Perspektywy MBA ranking regularly **highlights**⁵⁸ leading domestic programmes, **including**⁵⁹ Executive MBAs at Kozminski and SGH Warsaw School of Economics, as well as **partnerships**⁶⁰ such as the Poznań–Atlanta programme. These rankings are not perfect, but they do **indicate**⁶¹ which schools have **established reputations**⁶² and strong **alumni**⁶³ **outcomes**⁶⁴.

Formats

Polish MBAs are offered in several formats to **match**⁶⁵ different **career stages**⁶⁶ and lifestyles.

Full-time MBAs typically last one to two years and are aimed at younger professionals who are ready to take a **career break**⁶⁷ or change sector. **Part-time**⁶⁸ MBAs usually run over two to three years, with classes in the evenings or at weekends, allowing **participants**⁶⁹ to keep working and apply what they learn directly in their jobs. Executive MBAs are designed specifically for **corporate executives**⁷⁰ and senior managers already established in the **workforce**⁷¹. Delivered in modules or intensive long weekends, these programmes

Case Studies

“Piotr” is a senior engineer at a large Polish industrial firm. After years of technical success, he feels blocked from the management board because he lacks formal business training. Rather than move abroad, he **enrols in**¹ a respected Executive MBA in Warsaw, studying at weekends while remaining in his role. The programme gives him a **clear framework**² for finance, strategy and people management, helping him connect his practical experience with modern **management tools**³. Within a few years, he steps into a **commercial director**⁴ role and later joins the board. Both he and his company see the MBA as the bridge that turned a deep specialist into a **confident**⁵ executive – without any international **relocation**⁶.

“Magda”, **by contrast**⁷, works in consulting and dreams of operating on a global stage. She chooses an Executive MBA at a top European school with a highly international cohort. In addition to **rigorous**⁸ **coursework**⁹, she gains classmates from **dozens**¹⁰ of countries and access to a powerful worldwide alumni network. Returning to Poland, she uses this network and the school’s **global brand**¹¹ to win **cross-border**¹² projects and **advisory work**¹³ for international investors. Her MBA becomes an international passport, positioning her as a natural **link**¹⁴ between Polish business and global markets.

place a strong **emphasis on**⁷² developing advanced leadership potential, emotional intelligence, and skills for strategic **value creation**⁷³ and negotiating **pivotal**⁷⁴ deals. You’ll also see specialised MBAs (for example

in IT management, **ESG**⁷⁵ or **healthcare**⁷⁶). These can be useful if you know your niche, but make sure the programme still offers a solid general management **foundation**⁷⁷.

Cost, Funding and Local Networks⁷⁸

Tuition⁷⁹ can range significantly. At some public universities, **fees⁸⁰** for international students may be as low as EUR 2,000 – EUR 9,000 per year, but courses often **lack⁸¹** accreditation. In contrast, tuition for the most prestigious, internationally accredited executive programmes, like the Executive MBA at Kozminski University, typically ranges from PLN 85,000 to PLN 100,000 for the entire program **duration⁸²**. Still, even the most expensive Polish MBAs often cost less than just one semester at an elite US school.

To help with fees, Polish schools and foundations offer **merit** and **need-based⁸³** **scholarships⁸⁴**, and many employers are willing to co-finance Executive MBAs for **promising⁸⁵** managers. Some consulting firms even send **high performers⁸⁶** on MBAs as part of their **talent strategy⁸⁷**, paying most or all of the bill in exchange for a **commitment⁸⁸** to return.

Another major plus is the local alumni network. Graduates of SGH, Kozminski, technical university business schools and other leading programmes now hold key roles across Polish banking, consulting,

tech, **manufacturing⁸⁹** and the public sector. For those planning a **long-term⁹⁰** career in Poland, this domestic network can be just as powerful as an international one, especially when it comes to local **job moves⁹¹**, **board⁹²** roles or business partnerships.

Study Abroad⁹³: The Global MBA Experience

Every year, a smaller but determined group of Polish professionals **head⁹⁴** abroad for MBAs in Western Europe, the UK, the US or Canada. The attraction is prestige, global networks and access to the very **top tier⁹⁵** of business education. While **few⁹⁶** Polish schools **appear⁹⁷** in global rankings, programmes such as INSEAD, London Business School, Harvard or Wharton regularly do, **drawing⁹⁸** world-class **faculty⁹⁹** and highly **selective¹⁰⁰** **cohorts¹⁰¹**.

Studying in this **environment¹⁰²** means learning alongside **classmates¹⁰³** from many countries, being taught by leading **researchers¹⁰⁴**, and joining an alumni network spread across major **business hubs¹⁰⁵**. For Poles aiming at international consulting, global finance or senior roles in **multinationals¹⁰⁶**, a recognised **foreign¹⁰⁷** MBA can be a powerful **differentiator¹⁰⁸** both abroad and back in Poland, signalling that you have **proved yourself¹⁰⁹** in a **demanding¹¹⁰**, **competitive setting¹¹¹**.

Top schools expect strong **GMAT**¹¹² or **GRE**¹¹³ scores, **proof of English**¹¹⁴, several years of **meaningful**¹¹⁵ work experience and **persuasive**¹¹⁶ essays and recommendations. You must also **handle**¹¹⁷ visas, relocation and very high costs: tuition can run into tens of thousands of euros or dollars, plus **living expenses**¹¹⁸. Scholarships and grants help, and higher post-MBA salaries often make **loans**¹¹⁹ **manageable**¹²⁰, but the financial commitment still **requires**¹²¹ careful planning.

After graduation, Polish alumni abroad either stay on to build international experience or return home and use their new skills in the Polish or regional market. Those who come back often move faster into senior roles; those who stay abroad may build long-term global careers. In both cases, a good international MBA offers **flexibility**¹²² and a network that travels with you.

Planning Your Own MBA Journey

Whether you study in Warsaw or at a campus across the ocean, success with an MBA starts long before the first class. Most **reputable**¹²³ programmes expect at least a few years of work experience, and the degree is most powerful when you already have some **concrete**¹²⁴ **achievements**¹²⁵, a bit of **responsibility**¹²⁶ for people or budgets, and a **clear reason**¹²⁷ for doing it – a promotion, a career change, starting your own business or moving into a more international role. If those **pieces are in place**¹²⁸, the MBA becomes a logical next step rather than an expensive experiment.

Once you are in, the real value comes from how you use the experience. **Networking**¹²⁹, career services, projects and student activities can be as important as exams, especially if you push yourself beyond your **comfort zone**¹³⁰ and think carefully about how to apply what you learn back in Poland or abroad. In the end, you do not simply “get” value from an MBA – you create it through how actively and **thoughtfully**¹³¹ you **engage with**¹³² the journey.

Blaise Metreweli: Britain's New Female Spymaster¹

The Old School Tie

The old school tie refers both to an actual **necktie**¹ and to the **informal**² network linking former **pupils**³ of Britain's elite schools, such as Eton, Harrow and Winchester. Worn as a sign of shared background, the tie also symbolises the social connections that can open doors to prestigious careers in politics, the **civil service**⁴, diplomacy and the intelligence services. It represents both a visible **badge of privilege**⁵ and the **enduring**⁶ influence of Britain's old educational and **class system**⁷.

Until recently, **apart from**² the **fictitious**³ 'M' in Bond movies, MI6 had never had a female chief. Meet the new boss, who is **definitely**⁴ not the same as the old boss.

When the **glamorously**⁵ named Blaise Metreweli walked into the **HQ**⁶ of MI6 at the iconic SIS Building at Vauxhall Cross, to **take over**⁷ as its chief, she became the first woman ever to hold that position. The news, when it **broke**⁸ in mid-2025, travelled fast. **Unlike**⁹ the fictional "M" made famous by Judi Dench in the Bond films, her real title is "C" – the code name used by MI6 chiefs since the First World War.

Blaise Florence Metreweli was born in 1977 and grew up in Britain and Hong Kong **on account of**¹⁰ her father's work as a radiologist. This cosmopolitan **upbringing**¹¹ helped shape her **lifelong**¹² **ease**¹³ in international environments. Educated first at the elite Cheltenham Ladies' College and later at Westminster School, she was

a bright and athletic student, **eventually**¹⁴ going on to **read**¹⁵ Social Anthropology at Pembroke College, Cambridge. While figures are **elusive**¹⁶, perhaps necessarily, research shows that among Britain's

MI5, MI6

MI5 and MI6 were both founded in 1909 as parts of Britain's early Secret Service Bureau. MI5 **handles**¹ **domestic security**² and **counterespionage**³ within the UK, while MI6 (the Secret Intelligence Service) **gathers**⁴ intelligence **overseas**⁵. Both report to the **Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office**⁶ for coordination but serve **distinct**⁷ purposes.

senior **government**¹⁷ and diplomatic **leadership**¹⁸, around half have **attended**¹⁹ Oxford or Cambridge, so on paper at least, she has the right **credentials**²⁰.

While at Cambridge, she **rowed**²¹ competitively – a physically and mentally **demanding**²² **pursuit**²³ that helped develop qualities for the challenging roles that would follow. **Former**²⁴ **peers**²⁵ **recall**²⁶ her being **fiercely**²⁷ focused but calm **under pressure**²⁸, a **trait**²⁹ that later became the **hallmark**³⁰ of her professional life. After graduating in 1998, she joined the

intelligence service³¹ the following year, one of only a small number of women entering MI6 at that time.

Rising Through the Ranks³²

Ms Metreweli worked in the **Middle East**³³, where her **fluent**³⁴ **command**³⁵ of Arabic **proved**³⁶ **invaluable**³⁷. Specific **assignment**³⁸ details are **classified**³⁹, but it is thought that, under her **code name**⁴⁰ 'Ada,' she worked in Iran and the wider Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region. She worked on counterterrorism and political analysis during years of intense regional **upheaval**⁴¹, a period that gave her **first-hand experience**⁴² of diplomacy, **risk assessment**⁴³ and operating in the **unpredictable environment**⁴⁴ of **fieldwork**⁴⁵. In an interview with the Financial Times in 2021, before her **appointment**⁴⁶ as C, she commented on **espionage**⁴⁷ that "there are no rules of etiquette. Ironically, it becomes something like a neutral zone." She added that she felt women were **well-suited**⁴⁸ to managing such **fuzzy**⁴⁹ **boundaries**⁵⁰.

Over the next two decades, she held **postings**⁵¹ in Europe and **the Gulf**⁵² and worked closely with and within other **branches of government**⁵³, including the **Foreign Office**⁵⁴ and MI5. In **the latter**⁵⁵, she was **head**⁵⁶ of Directorate K, which assessed **threats**⁵⁷ from the likes of Russia and China. (See Fact box MI5 and MI6).

In **more recent years**⁵⁸, Ms Metreweli shifted her focus towards technology and innovation within the service. Leading the

technology division, she **oversaw**⁵⁹ projects aimed at adapting traditional **intelligence gathering**⁶⁰ to the digital world, where **data trails**⁶¹, cyberespionage and **artificial intelligence**⁶² now **shape the landscape**⁶³ as much as human **sources**⁶⁴ ever did. This

blend⁶⁵ of traditional field experience⁶⁶ and technical understanding made her a stand-out⁶⁷ candidate in an era when the lines between human and AI intelligence gathering have become blurred⁶⁸.

It is believed the appointment as chief boiled down to⁶⁹ a two-horse race between her and another woman, Barbara Woodward, former UK Ambassador to China. However, she had apparently blotted her copybook⁷⁰ by being too pro-Trump and openly critical of China, so Blaise Metreweli landed the plum job⁷¹.

Given⁷² the high-ranking⁷³ and politically sensitive⁷⁴ nature of the position, Blaise and her family could easily be terrorist targets. Consequently, very little is known about her personal life. She has children, still rows recreationally, but avoids publicity⁷⁵ of any kind. Not surprisingly, you won't find her posting photos on Facebook or anywhere else, for that matter.

Colleagues say she has a sense of humour⁷⁶ and dislikes grandstanding⁷⁷. Her manner, according to one former colleague, "doesn't fill a room but steadies it." It's a useful quality in an organisation that values calm over charisma, and poise⁷⁸ over pizzazz⁷⁹.

Woman in a Man's World

MI6 has always projected a certain image – discreet, masculine⁸⁰, and rooted in⁸¹ a culture of self-assured⁸² superiority⁸³. Traditionally, it has been populated by members⁸⁴ of the old school tie⁸⁵ (See Fact box) network. Even today, the agency remains heavily male-dominated, especially at the top. Women have long held analytical and operational roles, dating back to⁸⁶ the codebreakers⁸⁷ of Bletchley

Park during the Second World War, where women played a crucial part⁸⁸ in cracking⁸⁹ the Enigma code. However, such deeds⁹⁰ have not translated into commensurate⁹¹ presence⁹² in leadership roles.

After decades of male dominance, a woman has finally broken through the secret service⁹³ glass ceiling⁹⁴. But being the first female C also comes with intense scrutiny⁹⁵. Every decision she makes will inevitably⁹⁶ be judged, consciously⁹⁷ or not, through the lens⁹⁸ of gender. She is unlikely to be fazed⁹⁹ by this, nor the challenges that lie ahead.

It has become increasingly apparent¹⁰⁰ that the current geopolitical climate is at its most volatile¹⁰¹ and unpredictable¹⁰² since

the Cold War, and that technology in the form of hacking and other cyberattacks is drastically changing the nature of **national security**¹⁰³ and espionage. These **factors**¹⁰⁴ will **undoubtedly**¹⁰⁵ influence her **to-do list**¹⁰⁶. In her first months as Chief, she is expected to focus on three key areas:

- Rebuilding the agency's human networks **abroad**¹⁰⁷ after years of geopolitical **turbulence**¹⁰⁸.
- Strengthening cyberdefence **capabilities**¹⁰⁹.
- Deepening cooperation with **allies**¹¹⁰ across Europe and North America.

She also faces a quieter but equally significant **task**¹¹¹ of modernising the culture within the service. As the geopolitical and technology **landscapes**¹¹² have transformed, so too have the social and cultural **environments**¹¹³. While the British secret service has historically been associated with 'good breeding'¹¹⁴ and the best schools and universities, the new realities of the present and future will require **drawing on**¹¹⁵ a more **socially diverse**¹¹⁶ **talent pool**¹¹⁷.

A New Kind of Spymaster

In the public imagination, the head of MI6 has always been a figure of **authority**¹¹⁸ **tinged with**¹¹⁹ **mystique**¹²⁰. Blaise Metreweli brings both qualities but in a subtler form. She is not a **cinematic**¹²¹ archetype but a **thoughtful**¹²² professional leading one of the most secretive institutions in the world with calm, intellect, and a quiet **sense of purpose**¹²³.

Her appointment may be intended to step away from the old-boy's network image of the spymaster to one more **in tune with**¹²⁴ the **complexities**¹²⁵ of the modern world. Although, given her educational background, **it could be argued**¹²⁶ that she represents the less influential female **equivalent**¹²⁷ social elite of top girls' schools. Nonetheless, she is the closest thing to M to date. While she may never appear in the **end credits**¹²⁸ of a Bond film, Blaise Metreweli is, **without doubt**¹²⁹, the most interesting C MI6 has ever had.

Once **dismissed**³ as a utopian fantasy, the four-day working week has become a serious topic of debate in **boardrooms**⁴ and parliaments alike. Maybe it's not such a **daft**⁵ idea after all?

In 2015, Iceland began what seemed like a **bold**⁶ **social experiment**⁷: several thousand public-sector workers were offered the chance to **swap** their traditional five-day, 40-hour week **for**⁸ one lasting just 35–36 hours with no reduction in pay. It sounds like economic **suicide**⁹.

The **trials**¹⁰, which ran until 2019, were closely monitored across a range of **workplaces**¹¹, from offices and hospitals to schools and **local councils**¹², and the results were **contrary**¹³ to what many might have expected. Productivity remained the same or improved in most workplaces, while employee **well-being**¹⁴ rose significantly. Stress levels fell, job satisfaction increased and **absenteeism**¹⁵ dropped. In short, workers **achieved**¹⁶ as much, or more, in less time.

The trials were **hailed as**¹⁷ an “**overwhelming success**¹⁸,” and within a few years, **agreements**¹⁹ inspired by the experiment covered about 90 percent of Iceland’s **workforce**²⁰. Today, most Icelandic employees either work fewer hours or enjoy greater **flexibility**²¹ over how and when they work. This small Nordic country, with a population under 400,000, may have quietly provided the world with a new employment model, but could it work in the **industrial heartlands**²² or **frenetic**²³ **hospital wards**²⁴?

Gaining Momentum²⁵

One reason Iceland’s experiment attracted attention was its **breadth**²⁶ and realism. Unlike isolated start-up trials, it involved a **diverse**²⁷ range of roles, from office administrators to hospital **staff**²⁸, showing that shorter hours need not be limited to **white collar**²⁹ or creative jobs.

The message was clear: when people feel valued and **rested**³⁰, they often work more **efficiently**³¹. Iceland’s public sector workers showed that **meaningful**³² reform of the workweek is not only possible but can benefit both employers and employees.

Since Iceland’s success, similar experiments have **taken place**³³ around the world with **comparable**³⁴ results.

• **United Kingdom:** In 2022–2023, over 60 companies and 2,900 workers joined a six-month four-day week **pilot**³⁵. Staff worked 20 percent fewer hours for the same pay. Most companies continued the **scheme**³⁶, citing steady or improved productivity, lower **turnover**³⁷ and better employee well-being.

• **Netherlands:** Some **public sector**³⁸ organisations trialled shorter **schedules**³⁹. Results show higher job satisfaction, improved well-being and lower absenteeism. Strong **union**⁴⁰ support suggests wider **adoption**⁴¹ is possible.

• **Australia:** Several banks and tech companies ran pilots inspired by the UK. **Outcomes**⁴² include happier workers, reduced stress and stable productivity. Employers **reclaimed**⁴³ time lost to inefficient meetings and reporting.

And even the **notoriously**⁴⁴ workaholic Japanese have **dipped their toe in the water**⁴⁵ of a shorter working week.

• **Japan:** Companies like Panasonic and Microsoft trialled four-day weeks. Improved productivity and employee satisfaction were observed. The **government**⁴⁶ recommends offering four-day options **amid**⁴⁷ workforce and mental health concerns.

Stepping Away⁴⁸ From Work

While Iceland’s experiment **predated**⁴⁹ the pandemic, COVID-19 **profoundly**⁵⁰ accelerated global conversations about work.

Lockdowns **forced**⁵¹ millions into remote or hybrid **arrangements**⁵² almost **overnight**⁵³. Many companies discovered

that productivity could be **maintained**⁵⁴, or even raised, when employees had more autonomy over their time. Workers, **in turn**⁵⁵, began to prioritise flexibility, well-being and balance over working all hours to **impress**⁵⁶ the boss and **climb the greasy pole**⁵⁷.

This collective experience has reshaped **expectations**⁵⁸. The “new normal” has made many question the traditional **nine-to-five**⁵⁹, five-day model. As one UK business leader observed after his company’s four-day work week trial, “*COVID taught us that we could trust people to deliver⁶⁰ without watching the clock. The four-day work week is the next logical step.*”

In this post-pandemic environment, the idea of measuring work by **output**⁶¹ rather than hours now feels far more **attainable**⁶². Technological advances and digital **collaboration**⁶³ tools have made it easier to redesign **workflows**⁶⁴, simplify or automate **tasks**⁶⁵ making a shorter working week more realistic.

But what if workers start to think of it not as an option but a right? Could the four-day working week move from experiment to **entitlement**⁶⁶? Some **campaigners**⁶⁷ are pushing for **legal recognition**⁶⁸. History suggests that ideas once considered radical, such as **paid holidays**⁶⁹, **paternity leave**⁷⁰ and more recently, the **right to disconnect**⁷¹, (See Fact box) often start life **on the fringes**⁷² before becoming widely accepted as **reasonable**⁷³.

For employers, the strongest argument for a shorter week is largely economic rather than ethical. If the numbers **make the case**⁷⁴, they will need less **persuading**⁷⁵, as was the case with the **suspicion**⁷⁶ that unobserved, people working from home would **skive**⁷⁷.

The four-day week debate goes beyond scheduling to a **reappraisal**⁷⁸ of the purpose of work itself. In 1883, French political writer, essayist and economist Paul Lafargue **released**⁷⁹ the book *The Right to be Lazy*, in which he asked, “*if machines can do more of our work, why shouldn’t we work less?*” The **quote**⁸⁰ is often **attributed to**⁸¹ British economist John Maynard Keynes who, in 1930, wrote *Economic Possibilities for Our Grandchildren*, in which he **envisaged**⁸² a time when **wealth**⁸³

would be so **abundant**⁸⁴ that the need, or **desire**⁸⁵, to work would be greatly **diminished**⁸⁶. The **evidence**⁸⁷ from Iceland, and now from many other countries, suggests that reducing working hours does not

threaten⁸⁸ and may even guarantee prosperity⁸⁹ – so is it a no-brainer⁹⁰?

Time to Wake Up⁹¹ From Cloud-cuckoo-land⁹²

The four-day week sounds irresistible⁹³ – happier workers, stable or even increased productivity, and more time for leisure⁹⁴. Yet behind the glowing⁹⁵ pilot studies lies a more complex reality. For many countries and sectors, particularly those already grappling with⁹⁶ staff shortages⁹⁷ and ageing populations⁹⁸, shorter hours may be an unaffordable luxury⁹⁹.

Nowhere is this clearer than in the UK's overstretched¹⁰⁰ National Health Service¹⁰¹. With more than 100,000 vacancies¹⁰² in England alone and record waiting lists¹⁰³,

The Right to Disconnect

Since 2017 in France, and later in Italy and Spain, the right to disconnect is legally protected. Employers cannot require staff to¹ respond² to work emails or calls outside set hours³. The law protects work-life balance, reduces stress and burn-out⁴, and mandates clear company policies.

any reduction in contracted hours without a major **recruitment drive**¹⁰⁴ would simply reduce **clinical capacity**¹⁰⁵. For **public services**¹⁰⁶ already struggling to meet demand, cutting hours may be politically popular but operationally **out of the question**¹⁰⁷.

The same fiscal arithmetic worries **polycymakers**¹⁰⁸ elsewhere. The Netherlands, often cited as a model for work-life balance, is facing rising costs from an ageing population. **Pension**¹⁰⁹ and healthcare spending are climbing faster than **tax revenues**¹¹⁰, **prompting**¹¹¹ the Dutch finance ministry to warn of “*serious long-term budget pressure*”¹¹². **Encouraging** people **to**¹¹³ work shorter hours when the size of the workforce is smaller could deepen those pressures further.

Japan has one of the world’s oldest populations, its workforce is **shrinking**¹¹⁴ rapidly, and **public debt**¹¹⁵ already **exceeds**¹¹⁶ 250 percent of **GDP**¹¹⁷. While major companies such as Panasonic have tested four-day schedules, economists **point out**¹¹⁸ that a **nationwide**¹¹⁹ reduction in hours would **undermine**¹²⁰ the government’s urgent **drive**¹²¹ to **boost**¹²² **labour participation**¹²³ and productivity. Shorter weeks **are at loggerheads**¹²⁴ with the country’s demographic profile.

There are also equality concerns. Most successful trials have taken place in office-based sectors, where output can be measured and meetings **streamlined**¹²⁵. **Frontline jobs**¹²⁶ in health, **retail**¹²⁷, transport and **manufacturing**¹²⁸ can’t easily be compressed without extra staff or longer **shifts**¹²⁹ for existing ones. One group may benefit **at the expense of**¹³⁰ another.

The Icelandic model remains inspiring, but in the context of labour shortages, **public spending**¹³¹ cuts, unfilled vacancies and elderly populations, such a combination of factors may make the four-day working week in many countries as **ethereal**¹³² as the **Northern Lights**¹³³.

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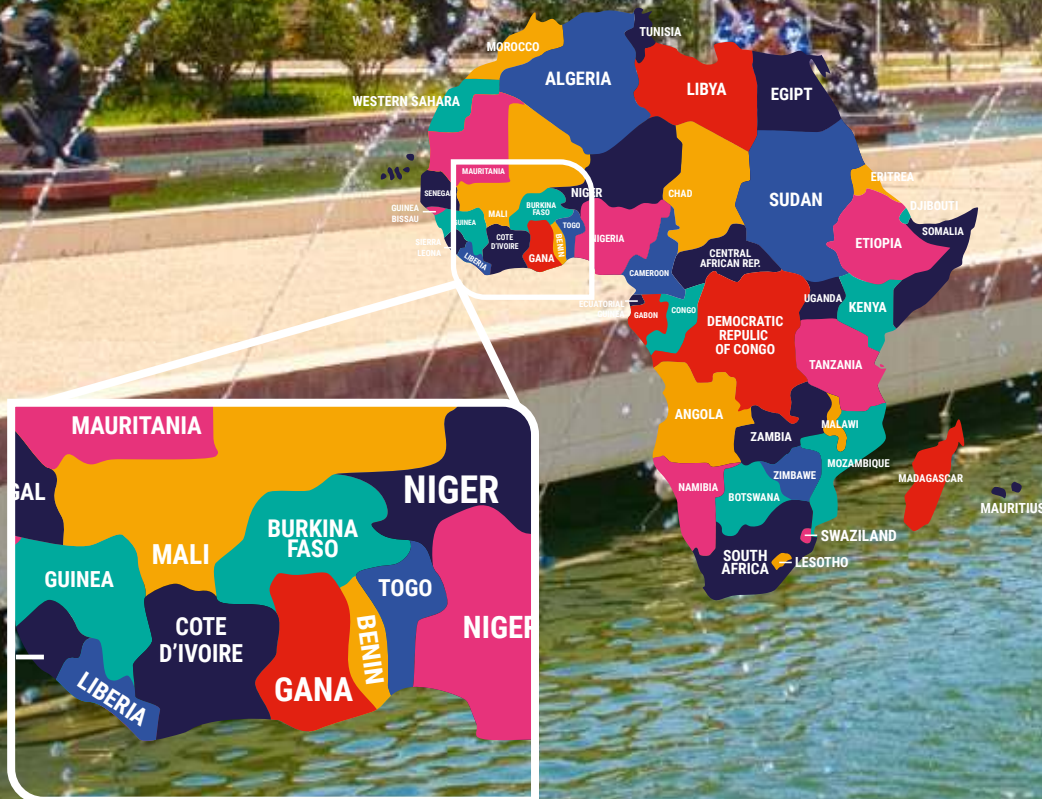

INFOBOX

The Republic of Ghana is located on the Gulf of Guinea in West Africa, **bounded by**¹⁰ by Côte d'Ivoire to the west, Burkina Faso to the north and Togo to the east. Its southern border meets the Atlantic Ocean, giving Ghana **unbroken access**¹¹ to **sea lanes**¹² and a tropical coast. With a **land area**¹³ of approximately 238,500 km², it is slightly smaller than the United Kingdom (around 242,500 km²) and of similar scale to Romania.

Though **compact**¹⁴ by African continental standards, the country's topography is **varied**¹⁵. The southern coastal belt **comprises**¹⁶ lagoons, **mangroves**¹⁷ and **low plains**¹⁸; **inland**¹⁹ from the coast lie forested hills and the Ashanti **uplands**²⁰; further north, the country **transitions**²¹ into savannah and broad plains that **edge towards**²² the Sahel. The **presence**²³ of the **artificial**²⁴ Lake Volta – one of the largest **man-made**²⁵ lakes by **surface area**²⁶ globally – adds to the geographic **diversity**²⁷ and provides energy, inland transport and **fisheries resources**²⁸.

The country's climate is **essentially**²⁹ tropical, but with regional variation. Along the coast and in the southern forested belt, the climate is **humid**³⁰ and receives two **wet seasons**³¹ (roughly³² April to June, and September to November). This rainfall supports tropical forest and rich **agricultural**³³ zones such as cocoa and oil-palm plantations. Heading northward, a long **dry season**³⁴ develops as temperatures rise and the **landscape**³⁵ becomes savannah and open **grassland**³⁶ with **dust storms**³⁷ and **water scarcity**³⁸. The sea breeze along the coast **moderates**³⁹ the extremes in the south. The more **fertile**⁴⁰ zones and coastal access have historically attracted **settlement**⁴¹ and **driven**⁴² agriculture and **trade**⁴³.

Proud History Marred⁴⁴ by Colonialism

Ghana's history is very much **rooted in**⁴⁵ the great West African **trade networks**⁴⁶ of the **medieval period**⁴⁷. The name "Ghana" was **adopted**⁴⁸ at **independence**⁴⁹, but echoes the older Ghana Empire (though that empire lay **primarily**⁵⁰ further north). **From**

around the 8th century **onwards**⁵¹, gold, salt, **cloth**⁵², **ivory**⁵³ and other goods passed through the region, carried on trans-Saharan caravans and exchanged along **riverine**⁵⁴ and forest routes.

In the 15th century, Europeans arrived: Portuguese, Dutch, British, Danish and other **fleets**⁵⁵ **established**⁵⁶ forts and trading posts along the coast, drawn by gold, **timber**⁵⁷ and eventually the **chilling**⁵⁸ **traffic**⁵⁹ of the **slave trade**⁶⁰.

In the 19th century, the British dominated the region and formally administered the territory as the **Gold Coast**⁶¹. In 1957, Ghana **achieved**⁶² independence – the first sub-Saharan African colony to do so in that wave – with Kwame Nkrumah as its first **prime minister**⁶³ and then president. Post-independence decades were marked by ambitious **social programmes**⁶⁴, **infrastructural push**⁶⁵, periods of economic

difficulty and political change. Since the 1990s, Ghana has consolidated as a multi-party democracy with [peaceful](#)⁶⁶ [transitions of power](#)⁶⁷, making it a regional [exemplar](#)⁶⁸ of political stability in West Africa.

A Youthful Population

Ghana's population is in the mid-30 million, growing [steadily](#)⁶⁹. It is youthful compared to many other countries.

- According to the 2023 [scenario briefing](#)⁷⁰ by the Institute for Security Studies (ISS Africa), the “[youth bulge](#)⁷¹” (population aged 15-29) stood at about 42.2 percent of the adult population in Ghana in 2023.
- Ghana's population has a very low median age of around 21–22 years.
- In sub-Saharan Africa as a whole, the share of the population under 15 years is approximately 39 percent.
- In the EU, about a third of the population is under 30.

Mole-Dagbon peoples, **inhabit**⁷⁸ the northern regions.

English is the **official language**⁷⁹, a **legacy**⁸⁰ of colonial rule, yet dozens of **indigenous**⁸¹ languages **flourish**⁸², and **local identities**⁸³ remain strong. **Literacy**⁸⁴ and schooling **rates**⁸⁵ have improved over recent decades, though educational and infrastructure **disparities**⁸⁶ **persist**⁸⁷ between urban and **rural areas**⁸⁸, and between the north and south. **Nonetheless**⁸⁹, Ghana is **scoring**⁹⁰ good **marks**⁹¹ in literacy compared to most of Africa.

Enjoy the Hiplife

Ghana's culture is **vibrant**⁹² and **many-layered**⁹³. Music plays an important role, particularly Afrobeat and more recently, 'hiplife.' (See West-African Music Fact Box).

Traditional festivals are celebrated across different regions (for example, the Ashanti's Adaye festivals, the Ewe's Hogbetsotso, and Fetu Afahye in Cape Coast), often accompanied by colourful dress, **drumming**⁹⁴, dancing and **communal**⁹⁵ ceremonies.

Crafts⁹⁶ such as kente **weaving**⁹⁷, **bead**⁹⁸ making, **wood-carving**⁹⁹ and **brass-casting**¹⁰⁰ remain important cultural expressions and attract both local and international interest.

For visitors with an interest in history, **significant**¹⁰¹ sites include the

UNESCO-listed Cape Coast Castle and Elmina Castle, central points for the **capture**¹⁰², **containment**¹⁰³ and **shipment**¹⁰⁴ of up to three million slaves.

Nature-lovers will want to head to Kakum National Park in the south-west, where a **canopy walkway**¹⁰⁵ through West African **rainforest**¹⁰⁶ offers rare wildlife sightings, **guided birdwatching**¹⁰⁷ **tours**¹⁰⁸, and night walks to spot **nocturnal**¹⁰⁹ **species**¹¹⁰. Visitors can stay in nearby **ecolodges**¹¹¹ or community-run camps that combine comfort with **sustainable**¹¹² practices. Further north, similar experiences can be had in the Mole National Park where savannah safaris offer the chance to see elephants, antelope, **warthogs**¹¹³ and a **variety**¹¹⁴ of birds. **Overnight stays**¹¹⁵ at lodges or camping sites within the park enable visitors to experience the bush at sunrise and sunset.

On the coast, beaches near Accra, Cape Coast and further west offer sun, surf and relaxation, making Ghana a growing destination for seaside tourism. In Accra, the Labadi Beach and Kokrobite Beach are the most popular for both locals and visitors. Labadi **features**¹¹⁶ **lively**¹¹⁷ weekend **entertainment**¹¹⁸, horse riding and beachside bars, while Kokrobite has a more **laid-back**¹¹⁹ **vibe**¹²⁰ with music, local food **stalls**¹²¹ and **guesthouses**¹²². Moving west along the coast, Cape Coast and Elmina offer quieter, **scenic**¹²³ beaches that can be combined with cultural visits to the historic castles. Further west, towns such as Busua and Axim provide opportunities for surfing, fishing trips, and staying in **boutique lodges**¹²⁴ or **eco-resorts**¹²⁵ that **cater to**¹²⁶ a mix of adventure and comfort.

Accra itself has much to offer beyond the coastline. The city's vibrant markets, such as Makola Market, sell textiles, crafts and **spices**¹²⁷, while cultural attractions include the W.E.B. Du Bois Centre, Independence Square and the Kwame Nkrumah Mausoleum. **Art galleries**¹²⁸, restaurants and **nightlife venues**¹²⁹ add to the urban experience. In general, Accra is considered relatively safe for tourists, though, as in any major city, visitors are advised to take standard **precautions**¹³⁰, avoid walking alone at night in **unfamiliar**¹³¹ areas,

and secure **belongings**¹³² in **busy**¹³³ **public spaces**¹³⁴.

West African Music

Afrobeat is a vibrant music **genre**¹ that **emerged**² in the late 1960s and early 1970s in West Africa, pioneered by Nigerian musician Fela Kuti. It combines traditional African rhythms, highlife, jazz, funk and soul, often featuring complex polyrhythms, layered percussion, **horns**³, electric guitars, bass and keyboards. The most famous Ghanaian musician is Reggie Rockstone. He is often **credited as**⁴ the “**Godfather**⁵ of **Hiplife**,” a genre that **blends**⁶ highlife, hip-hop, and Afrobeat rhythms.

London, Frankfurt, Amsterdam, Paris and Istanbul. Flight times vary depending on the **departure**¹⁴¹ city, but typically take between six to seven hours direct.

Once in Accra, **domestic**¹⁴² flights, buses, or private transfers **enable**¹⁴³ access to the main tourist and business destinations along the coast and inland. Really adventurous travellers might want to experience a **daredevil**¹⁴⁴ ride in a local minibus known as a trotro, **replete with**¹⁴⁵ loud music, lively passengers and **combative**¹⁴⁶ drivers.

If you are looking for something **out of the ordinary**¹⁴⁷ with variety, colour, excellent weather and friendly **hosts**¹⁴⁸, Ghana ticks all the boxes¹⁴⁹.

Business in Ghana

Ghana's economy is one of Africa's emerging success stories. While it does not **match**¹⁵⁰ Africa's giants such as Nigeria, South Africa or Egypt in absolute **GDP**¹⁵¹, it **ranks among**¹⁵² the **top tier**¹⁵³ of growth-oriented economies in West Africa. According to recent reports, Ghana achieved real GDP growth in the mid-single-digits, driven by **commodity**¹⁵⁴ exports, **services**¹⁵⁵, infrastructure investment and political stability.

ts **natural-resource endowment**¹⁵⁶ has been a **foundation**¹⁵⁷ for growth, yet the country has actively diversified into **agriculture**¹⁵⁸, **manufacturing**¹⁵⁹, oil and gas, and services.

Because of its English-speaking status, coastal access, with large ports such as Tema Harbour in the south, and a relatively stable democracy, Ghana is often considered a regional hub for investment in West Africa. From an export perspective, Ghana's economy **pivots on**¹⁶⁰ three pillars:

- Gold
- Cocoa
- Oil and gas

Each plays a significant role in **foreign-exchange**¹⁶¹ generation.

Key Economic Activities

Agriculture remains a **cornerstone**¹⁶²; Ghana is a world-leading cocoa producer and also grows oil palm, **rubber**¹⁶³, **maize**¹⁶⁴, and **cassava**¹⁶⁵. The industrial sector **contributes**¹⁶⁶ roughly a third of GDP, with

mining¹⁶⁷, light manufacturing and **food processing**¹⁶⁸ forming key components.

Services, including telecommunications, banking, trade, **fintech**¹⁶⁹ and tourism, are expanding rapidly, providing **employment**¹⁷⁰ and **economic output**¹⁷¹. The oil and gas sector adds **government revenue**¹⁷² and foreign exchange, though its **capital-intensive**¹⁷³ nature **limits**¹⁷⁴ local employment absorption. Mining, particularly gold, is both economically and geopolitically significant.

Tourism: An Increasingly Important Sector

Tourism is a growing contributor to Ghana's economy, both **in terms of**¹⁷⁵ revenues and employment.

In 2024, international arrivals reached 1.29 million, up 12 percent from the previous year. **Estimated**¹⁷⁶ tourism revenue hit record levels, supporting hotels, restaurants, transport, and tour operators. The sector directly and indirectly provides hundreds of thousands of jobs, particularly in coastal and **heritage regions**¹⁷⁷.

The Growing Gold Trade

Gold remains Ghana's **flagship**¹⁷⁸ export. In 2024, production reached 4.8 million **ounces**¹⁷⁹ (see Fact Box), a 19.3

Ounces of Gold

Gold has been traded in ounces for **centuries**¹, and the **troy ounce**², the standard used for **precious metals**³, **traces its origins**⁴ to the medieval trading system in Troyes, France, rather than Ancient Greece. Adopted in the 18th century in the United Kingdom, the troy ounce provides a **consistent**⁵ standard for gold, silver and other precious metals.

One troy ounce equals approximately 31.1035 grams, or 0.0311 kilograms. Using Troy ounces ensures **uniformity**⁶ in reporting gold production, reserves, and trading across mines, **commodity exchanges**⁷ and industry publications worldwide.

counting for¹⁸² 57 percent of merchandise exports¹⁸³, and the industry contributed GHS 17.7 bln (Ghananian cedi) in taxes¹⁸⁴, a 51 percent increase year-on-year¹⁸⁵.

In April 2025, the Ghana Gold Board (GoldBod) announced¹⁸⁶ measures to purchase portions of gold output to bolster¹⁸⁷ reserves and reduce smuggling, formalising a sector central to Ghana's economic strategy.

Trade, Investment Climate, and Infrastructure

Ghana's export basket¹⁸⁸ remains commodity-heavy, exposing the country to¹⁸⁹ global price shocks¹⁹⁰. However, it offers a relatively favourable investment climate:

- English law underpins¹⁹¹ business contracts
 - Accra serves as a banking and telecom hub
 - Upgraded¹⁹² ports at Tema and Takoradi facilitate¹⁹³ trade
- Investment opportunities include:
- Agribusiness (cocoa/chocolate processing, horticulture¹⁹⁴)
 - Mineral value-addition (gold refining)
 - Renewable energy¹⁹⁵ (hydropower, solar, wind)
 - Digital services¹⁹⁶ and fintech

Beyond gold and agriculture, Ghana offers opportunities in:

- Energy: offshore gas, hydropower, solar and wind projects
- Tourism: new resorts, upgraded air and road access, eco-lodges
- Digital economy: mobile-money¹⁹⁷ platforms, internet services, start-ups
- Partnerships¹⁹⁸ between local and international firms can create value chains¹⁹⁹ in manufacturing, service delivery, and regional distribution.

Business Environment and Challenges²⁰⁰

While Ghana offers a relatively favourable²⁰² climate for investors compared with many West African peers²⁰³, doing business is not without hurdles²⁰⁴.

Currency²⁰⁵ volatility²⁰⁶ can affect costs and profits, particularly for companies reliant on²⁰⁷ imported inputs²⁰⁸ or exporting in foreign currencies. Public-debt pressures²⁰⁹ occasionally prompt²¹⁰ tighter fiscal policies²¹¹, which can influence taxation and government spending.

Bureaucracy and infrastructure bottlenecks²¹² remain significant considerations²¹³. Registering a business is straightforward²¹⁴ for foreigners, and non-Ghanaian investors can legally establish companies, often with 100 percent ownership²¹⁵, though some sectors may require local partnerships.

However, the process can be slowed by administrative delays²¹⁶, with obtaining business licenses or permits²¹⁷ typically taking 2-8 weeks, approvals²¹⁸ for land use or construction ranging from 1-3 months, and environmental compliance clearances²¹⁹ sometimes extending to 4-6 months, depending on the agency and location.

Corruption, while declining²²⁰, is still a factor in certain sectors, and companies may need to navigate²²¹ informal payments²²² or delays in public services²²³.

Installing utilities²²⁴ such as electricity, water, and telecommunications can take time, particularly outside Accra or other major cities. For example:

- Electricity: In Accra or Kumasi, a new residential or small-business

connection may take 4-6 weeks if all documents and deposits are in order. Outside major cities, rural or semi-urban areas can face **waits**²²⁵ of 3-6 months, especially if transformer upgrades or new lines are needed.

- Water: Urban connections often take 2-8 weeks, while rural areas may require several months for **pipeline**²²⁶ **extensions**²²⁷ or new **boreholes**²²⁸.

- Telecommunications/Internet: Mobile connections are immediate, but a **fixed broadband connection**²²⁹ can take 1-3 months in cities; in smaller towns, it may take longer due to limited infrastructure.

Delays are usually caused by bureaucracy, infrastructure limitations, and the need for inspections before service activation. For investors or new businesses,

planning and coordinating early with utility **providers**²³⁰ is **essential**²³¹ to avoid **operational disruptions**²³².

Getting paid can also present challenges: delayed payments are not **uncommon**²³³ in both private and public contracts, **emphasising**²³⁴ the importance of clear contracts, local **legal support**²³⁵, and **risk management**²³⁶ strategies.

Despite these **obstacles**²³⁷, Ghana's relative political stability, English-language business environment, and growing digital and service sectors make it a **viable**²³⁸ and attractive destination for investors willing to manage **frontier-market**²³⁹ risks.

African Gold

Gold has been mined in Africa for millennia. West African **kingdoms**¹ such as Ghana (ancient Ghana), Mali and Songhai built wealth on the trans-Saharan gold trade from c. AD 700-1600, exchanging gold for salt, textiles and horses. Europeans intensified gold **extraction**² from the 15th century, and colonial powers later industrialised mining, often with **exploitative**³ practices. In the 20th and 21st centuries, modern mining corporations and state actors have dominated large-scale extraction, while **artisanal miners**⁴ still provide much of the continent's output. Today, West Africa and Southern Africa are home to many of the continent's largest gold producers, and gold remains a **vital**⁵ export earner.

Incredible New Translation Tools Have Arrived – But Will They Get Lost in Translation¹?

Within the last few months, Apple and Google have **rolled out**² popular new tools that make language translation faster and easier than ever. Is that completely positive? BEM's Michael Gaylord **put on**³ his new Ray Ban glasses to **get to the bottom of**⁴ this trend.

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For years now, we've been **accustomed to**⁵ using **familiar**⁶ **on-line services**⁷ such as Google Translate to successfully learn new **target language**⁸ **vocabulary**⁹, check **grammatical accuracy**¹⁰, and even **facilitate**¹¹ communication with friends who

speak languages different from our own. For the most part¹², these have worked quite well, especially as new features¹³ such as audio examples have been added. However, with the help of artificial intelligence¹⁴ (AI), recent translation tools developed¹⁵ by the big tech¹⁶ companies have taken speech translation to a new level.

How Do They Work?

Two people speak to each other in their respective¹⁷ languages. After each utterance¹⁸, there is a delay¹⁹ of a few seconds during which time the tool translates the speech from, say, English to Spanish. The voice that the listener hears, which is computer generated, mimics²⁰ the original speaker's intonation and voice. Although manufacturers²¹ won't reveal²² all, the data²³ collected which allows the translators to work is likely²⁴ taken from existing translation services, textbooks²⁵, and government²⁶ documents.

Available²⁷ Translators

The best products currently on the market (with some others in the works²⁸) appear to be Google Meet's live translation (video conferencing tool), Meta's Ray Ban glasses, the latter²⁹ translating speech almost in real time³⁰ as the user wears the ultralight, rather³¹ stylish³² glasses. A third tool, an update³³ to Apple's AirPods earbuds³⁴, will also translate languages from speech on the fly³⁵. It's still in the works. This foray into³⁶ the live translation market is notable³⁷, said senior business editor³⁸ at WIRED magazine, Louise Mataskis. "The company tends to hold back³⁹ [on introducing⁴⁰ new tech features] until that technology is really mature⁴¹ and they know it's going to be reliable⁴². So, I think this shows that this technology is starting to mature", she said in an interview⁴³ with CBC's Piya Chattopadhyay. She also mentioned⁴⁴ that the newer generation tools are better at deciphering⁴⁵ the meaning⁴⁶ of slang terminology.

A Few Wrinkles⁴⁷

As impressive⁴⁸ as the technology is, there appear to be some limitations⁴⁹ and even a few potential problems. Google's product allows for translation only between Spanish and English, while the Ray Bans accommodate⁵⁰ just four languages (French and Italian, in addition to Spanish and English). Google Meet is also limited, in that users must be in the US and must be Google AI Pro premium service members⁵¹. That tidbit⁵² of info could be translated to something

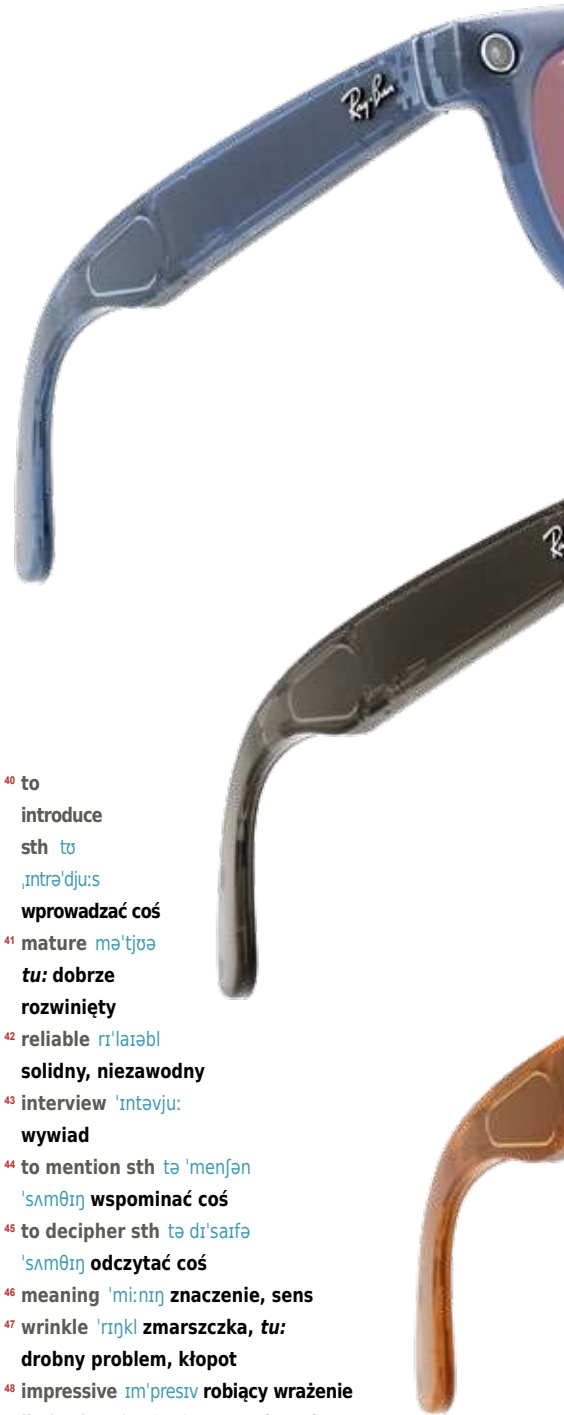

like: you gotta pay a **pretty penny**⁵³ for it! **Furthermore**⁵⁴, it doesn't save users' audio. However, Google is expected to **add**⁵⁵ more languages in the very near future, **according to**⁵⁶ a **representative**⁵⁷ interviewed by media.

Some **skeptics**⁵⁸ **question**⁵⁹ how effectively Google's translator works in a real meeting, noting that people don't usually have clear, **fluid**⁶⁰ conversations with each other. "They typically will **overlap**⁶¹ or **interrupt**⁶², and [there is the possibility of] a **cacophony**⁶³

occurring⁶⁴ when people are excitedly **talking back and forth**⁶⁵ [...] and voices **cutting in**⁶⁶ and then **cutting back out**⁶⁷ again. How is that controlled?" said Roger Krueze, a professor who specialises in the psychology of language at the University of Memphis in the US.

Additionally, while the tech companies producing the tools **claim**⁶⁸ they use objectivity to translate, are they able to **capture**⁶⁹ the nuance of language? Some **point out**⁷⁰ that existing translations can, at times, be formal, even **stifled**⁷¹. "Language is not neutral. What we learn in a textbook is not necessarily the way we speak", Mataskis added in her interview. According to

critics, the translators **assume**⁷² there's only one way to translate a **wide array of**⁷³ words, **expressions**⁷⁴ and slang.

Such **monolithic**⁷⁵ **approaches to**⁷⁶ translation don't fully **consider**⁷⁷ **cultural factors**⁷⁸ that greatly **influence**⁷⁹ language. One user shared an example with BEM. "[While using a **textual**⁸⁰ translation tool to translate from English to **Mandarin**⁸¹], the barista in the **coffee shop**⁸² would look at me funny when I asked her if I could use their toilet (in the American way), 'Do you have a bathroom here?', which was a strange way to ask to use the toilet because in Mandarin they don't give people possession of things at their jobs. **Therefore**⁸³, to her it appeared that I was asking her a **ridiculous**⁸⁴ question – of course they had a toilet", she said.

So, if the new **instant**⁸⁵ speech translation tools use **state media**⁸⁶ texts to provide vocabulary, the translation could **end up**⁸⁷ being too **dry**⁸⁸. Because **certain**⁸⁹ sounds that have no **equivalent**⁹⁰ in the target language, they could present challenges for tools expected to make instant translations. "Culture plays a big role when it comes to language, and therefore we can't **paint** all these languages **with the same brush**⁹¹, in a sense", noted Mohammad Abdul Mageed, a university **researcher**⁹² specialising in **natural language processing**⁹³ and **machine learning**⁹⁴. "Historically, translation **apps**⁹⁵ have had trouble detecting and **properly**⁹⁶ translating **homophones**⁹⁷ or sarcasm", he added.

The New Tools Could Facilitate Language Learning

It's worth pointing out that there are some **conceivable**⁹⁸ positives to the development of the new, AI-assisted fast translators. Advances in machine learning could assist in the **preservation**⁹⁹ of dying languages. In this sense, it could be seen as a way of **maintaining**¹⁰⁰ **biodiversity**¹⁰¹. "We want to preserve the **animal kingdom**¹⁰², the **plant kingdom**¹⁰³. Language is a part of us, right? And if we let certain languages go, we are letting parts of us go", added Mageed. Also, if people use the language tools to **aid**¹⁰⁴ their learning, rather than **depend on**¹⁰⁵ them, it could **pave the way**¹⁰⁶ for additional learning **settings**¹⁰⁷ – after achieving a comfortable level of communicative fluency, one could be more likely to go to the café with a friend fluent in the target language and **chatting**¹⁰⁸ with them in a natural way, for example.

Yet, as **convenient**¹⁰⁹ as these new "live" translators can be, they are not a **worthy substitute**¹¹⁰ for learning a new language **on one's own**¹¹¹. Many **scientists**¹¹² maintain that learning languages improves our

brain's **neuroplasticity**¹¹³. What's more, some **caution**¹¹⁴ that a lot of work will be needed as tech companies expand the AI-based language tools to **cover**¹¹⁵ additional language – after all, there are over 7,000 languages globally. They will have to take extra care when building language models that translate from European languages to Arabic, East Asian and African languages. At this point, perhaps the best approach is to think of tools such as Meta's Ray Bans and Google Meet's Live Translator not as **intermediaries**¹¹⁶ between us and our international friends and colleagues. Instead, they can be viewed as a way of **supporting**¹¹⁷ those social and professional **connections**¹¹⁸.

Jonathan Brill

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The Brilliant Jonathan Brill

This is the story of how a frog turned into an **octopus**¹, and ultimately a **thought leader**² on business transformation.

Jonathan Brill was born in the United States in 1967. Little is publicly known about his **childhood**³, but his later career shows early signs of **curiosity**⁴ about how technology and human imagination **intersect**⁵. He has said that as a child, he was fascinated by how things worked and would **dismantle**⁶ toys to understand their mechanisms. These days, he **dissects**⁷ organisations to see how they work.

He studied Industrial Design at the Pratt Institute in New York, where he learned to combine creativity with practical **problem solving**⁸. He later completed **executive**⁹ training at the Stanford Graduate School of Business and worked as a **research consultant**¹⁰ at the MIT Media Lab. This unusual combination of design thinking, technology, and business strategy became the **foundation**¹¹ of his professional life. It explains why his **approach**¹² to futurism is never abstract or academic, but **rooted in**¹³ how ideas can be **applied**¹⁴ in the real world.

From Frog to Octopus

His career began in design and **product innovation**¹⁵. He worked as Creative Director at the **consultancy**¹⁶ Frog Design, one of the world's best-known design firms. There, he helped clients turn ideas into products – more than 350 of them in

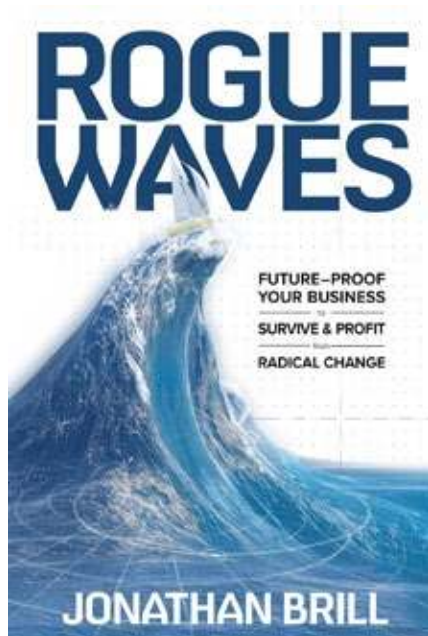

total, which together generated tens of billions of dollars.

That practical **grounding**¹⁷ in innovation led him naturally to think about the future of organisations. How could companies not only invent new things but also **reinvent themselves**¹⁸? He moved into strategy and **foresight**¹⁹, becoming Global Futurist and Research Director at HP Inc., where he advised on long-term trends shaping technology and **society**²⁰. His **remit**²¹ included examining how automation, digital platforms and **artificial intelligence**²² would **affect**²³ the way companies operate.

Brill now **chairs**²⁴ the Center for Radical Change, advising corporate leaders and **governments**²⁵ on transformation and innovation. He is a **sought-after**²⁶ **keynote speaker**²⁷ and consultant for firms **navigating**²⁸ **disruption**²⁹. Harvard Business Review recently described him as “the world’s leading transformation architect”, while Forbes has named him the top-ranked futurist.

Publications and ideas

Johnathan Brill’s thinking is expressed most clearly in his two **major**³⁰ books.

His first, **Rogue Waves**³¹: *Future-Proof Your Business to Survive and Profit from Radical Change* (2021), uses the metaphor

of a rogue wave – a **sudden**³², unexpected and often destructive **surge**³³ in the ocean, to describe how **converging**³⁴ disruptions can hit organisations **without warning**³⁵. Rather than trying to predict each wave, he **urges**³⁶ companies to design themselves to **stay afloat**³⁷ **no matter what comes next**³⁸. It’s a **manual**³⁹ for building **resilience**⁴⁰ and opportunity in a **turbulent**⁴¹ world.

His second book, *AI and the Octopus Organization: Building the Superintelligent Firm* (2025), is even more ambitious. It explores how companies need to restructure themselves for the age of artificial intelligence. The central image, the octopus, **captures**⁴² how an organisation can become **flexible**⁴³ and intelligent, with decision-making distributed across its **limbs**⁴⁴ rather than concentrated in a central head.

“The octopus isn’t just a metaphor,” Brill says. “It’s a biological **operating system**⁴⁵ for resilience.” In his view, the future of business will not be hierarchical but **net-worked**⁴⁶. Intelligence will no longer reside at the top of a pyramid but at the **edges**⁴⁷, close to customers, **data**⁴⁸ and action.

He **argues**⁴⁹ that most AI projects fail not because the technology is **weak**⁵⁰ but because the organisations adopting it are still built for the **industrial age**⁵¹. “AI **deployments**⁵² **rarely**⁵³ fail because the algorithms don’t work,” he explains. “They fail because the technology is introduced into organisations that were never designed to take advantage of it.”

Brill’s Octopus model has three **key features**⁵⁴:

- **Distributed**⁵⁵ **decision-making**⁵⁶ – “Eight Arms.” **Authority**⁵⁷ is pushed to the edges of the organisation so that teams closest to customers and information can act quickly without waiting for central **approval**⁵⁸.

- **Seamless connectivity**⁵⁹ – “The Neural Necklace⁶⁰.” Data and **intelligence**⁶¹ flow freely between the centre and the periphery, linking every part of the organisation through AI-driven communication and **shared insight**⁶².
- **Balanced leadership**⁶³ rhythms – “Three Hearts.” Leadership operates on three **complementary**⁶⁴ rhythms: analytical, **agile**⁶⁵ and **aligned**⁶⁶, **ensuring that**⁶⁷ strategy, innovation and **execution**⁶⁸ move in harmony rather than in isolation.

His message is that the next generation of firms must think, feel and act more like living organisms than machines.

Advice

His **appeal**⁶⁹ lies partly in his ability to make complex ideas sound human and practical. He often **frames**⁷⁰ transformation as a **mindset**⁷¹ rather than a project plan. “You don’t have to predict the future,” he says. “You just have to know how to change with it.”

He tells leaders to start small: find one decision that **wastes**⁷² time and deliver it faster and better by **empowering**⁷³ the people closest to it with data and AI. “Transformation begins when people see AI working for them – **simplifying**⁷⁴ **workflows**⁷⁵, **uncovering**⁷⁶ **insights**, **reducing friction**⁷⁷.”

He also **warns**⁷⁸ that technology alone will not save a **poorly**⁷⁹ designed company. “Success comes not from automating tasks

but from **reimagining**⁸⁰ how organisations function at every level.”

He challenges people to **take an honest look in the mirror**⁸¹. “Ask yourself, what are the things we won’t do? That’s the **blue ocean**⁸². That’s where the opportunity lies.” He encourages leaders to focus on structural change rather than **incremental**⁸³ improvement, thus freeing human potential by redesigning the way work itself is organised.

Why His Work Matters⁸⁴

Jonathan Brill’s influence **stems from**⁸⁵ three main **factors**⁸⁶.

Credibility⁸⁷. He is not an **academic**⁸⁸ observing from a distance. He has spent years building real products and **guiding**⁸⁹ innovation in global firms. When he talks about the friction between creativity and corporate systems, he speaks from experience.

Clarity⁹⁰. His metaphors, such as rogue waves and octopuses, are **vivid**⁹¹ but not **gimmicky**⁹². They give executives a language for thinking about change that feels alive and **urgent**⁹³. He manages to turn abstract trends like AI and automation into practical questions of design and structure.

Actionability⁹⁴. He doesn’t stop at describing problems; he offers concrete steps. His model for the Octopus Organisation **sets out**⁹⁵ how to push authority to the edges, connect teams through intelligent systems and build resilience into the DNA of the organisation.

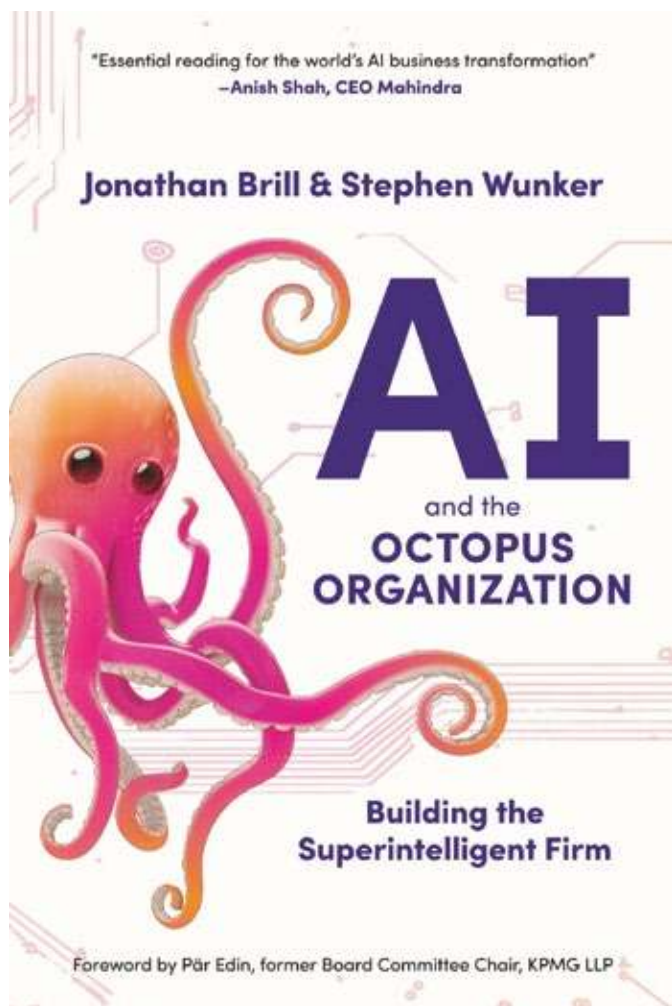

His ideas arrive at a time when many companies are experimenting with AI, but few are **rethinking**⁹⁶ their organisational architecture. Most still operate on **principles**⁹⁷ designed for a slower, more **predictable**⁹⁸ world, **layers**⁹⁹ of hierarchy, centralised control, and **information bottlenecks**¹⁰⁰. His insight is that AI does not fit **neatly**¹⁰¹ into those structures. To gain its benefits, organisations must change shape.

In his words, “AI’s true promise isn’t replacing humans – it’s **amplifying**¹⁰² our ability to coordinate at **unprecedented scale**¹⁰³.” He sees it as a chance to reimagine **collaboration**¹⁰⁴.

His **background**¹⁰⁵ in industrial design explains much of his approach. Designers are trained to see systems as **interconnected**¹⁰⁶, to balance beauty, function and **user experience**¹⁰⁷. He brings that same **sensibility**¹⁰⁸ to strategy and leadership. To him,

ers because they are structured to notice and **seize**¹¹⁹ **unexpected**¹²⁰ opportunities. Watch this space if you want to get lucky!

Time to Morph¹²¹

Jonathan Brill’s **core message**¹²² is simple but radical: in the age of AI, success will depend less on **efficiency**¹²³ and more on **adaptability**¹²⁴. Organisations must learn to sense, **respond**¹²⁵ and evolve like living systems. The companies that do so will not just **survive**¹²⁶ the coming waves of change; they will ride them.

As the **boundaries**¹²⁷ between human and machine intelligence continue to **blur**¹²⁸, Brill’s vision of the octopus organisation offers a warning and a **roadmap**¹²⁹. Those who **cling to**¹³⁰ **rigid**¹³¹ hierarchies may drown in the next surge of disruption.

an organisation is a kind of designed **artefact**¹⁰⁹: one that must evolve continuously as its environment changes.

Colleagues describe him as energetic, analytical and **relentlessly**¹¹⁰ **curious**¹¹¹. He enjoys challenging **assumptions**¹¹² and asking **awkward**¹¹³ questions about how decisions are made. His speaking style mixes optimism with urgency; he **insists**¹¹⁴ that disruption can be **harnessed**¹¹⁵ rather than feared, but only by those **willing to**¹¹⁶ rebuild themselves.

He has **hinted**¹¹⁷ at a further project around “*strategic luck*,” the idea that some organisations seem naturally more **fortunate**¹¹⁸ than oth-

Those who **embrace**¹³² flexibility, intelligence and connection will **thrive**¹³³. For that reason, Jonathan Brill stands among the most influential **thinkers**¹³⁴ in the architecture of transformation.

Business Dialogues:

When the Numbers Don't Add Up¹

NimbusQ once called itself “the future of smart **scheduling**².” Investors agreed. Last year, the company **raised money**³ **at a high valuation**⁴ and **hired**⁵ quickly. But sales slowed, growth targets were missed, and cash started **disappearing**⁶ faster than planned. To **survive**⁷, the company now must **raise**⁸ new **investment**⁹, but **at a much lower valuation**¹⁰.

CEO¹¹ Lena must sit with her **board**¹², accept the financial reality, and decide who will stay, who will go, and how to explain everything without destroying what **remains**¹³ of the **company culture**¹⁴.

ACT 1: Difficult News

A quiet **boardroom**¹⁵. Afternoon light reflects on the long glass table. Three people sit with laptops open but untouched. **Victor** (lead investor) closes a document on his screen.

Victor: We have the final offer. The deal is confirmed. The investor will **wire**¹⁶ the money, but the valuation is eighty million.

(**Lena** looks up. Her last round was at 160 mln).

Lena: That means the company is now worth half of what it was.

Priya: I'm afraid so. It's officially a **down-round**¹⁷.

There is a long pause.

Lena: Last year, I told the team that we were on a growth rocket. We doubled **headcount**¹⁸. People left stable jobs because they believed in our vision. Now I need to explain why we are suddenly... **going backwards**¹⁹.

Victor: Look, if it helps, you're not

the only one. The market has changed. Investors want profit, not just growth. Every company is being valued lower, even big ones.

Priya: We don't **approve**²⁰ the down-round because we don't believe in you. We approve it because we *do* believe in you, and we want the company to survive.

Lena (softly): So what must we do?

Victor: **Cut costs**²¹ until you can survive eighteen months without more funding.

Priya: That means big decisions. Not just **cancelling**²² **software**²³ subscriptions, you must reduce people.

Lena: I understand the numbers. I just wish they weren't connected to real humans.

Victor: Nobody enjoys this. But if you do nothing now, everyone will lose their job later. This is survival, not **surrender**²⁴. Lena is silent again. She presses her fingers together.

Lena: I can face financial reality. I just hate the idea of **breaking trust**²⁵.

Priya: Then don't break it. Communicate honestly, treat people with respect, and some of them will stay. But you cannot **avoid the pain**²⁶.

ACT 2: The Choices

Next morning. A small meeting room. Screens show financial graphs. Mateo, the CFO²⁷, has been up since 5am.

Lena: I need multiple versions of a cost-cutting plan, not just one.

Mateo: Done. I created three.

He pushes a document across the table.

Mateo: Option A: Small cuts: nine months of runway²⁸. Option B: Medium cuts: one year. Option C: Major restructure²⁹: eighteen months.

Lena: Explain "major restructure."

Mateo: We shrink³⁰ the company by twenty-five percent. Around forty people. Mostly sales and operations³¹. Engineering and product stay mostly intact³²; we must protect what makes us valuable³³.

Lena: And if we take the smaller option?

Mateo: Then we will be right back here in nine months, asking for money again. And we will look even weaker.

Lena: And morale?

Mateo: It will fall in every scenario. The difference is whether we manage it or ignore it. If layoffs³⁴ feel random³⁵, people will panic and leave. If we are transparent³⁶, and if we give the people who stay a real reason³⁷ to commit³⁸, we can stabilise.

Lena: A reason like... what?

Mateo: Fresh stock options³⁹. Not huge grants⁴⁰, but enough for people to feel the company still belongs to them.

Lena (thinking aloud): That means layoffs and equity grants on the same day.

Mateo: Yes. Imagine you are one of the survivors: you've just watched your friends lose their jobs. Tomorrow you get a LinkedIn message offering a higher salary somewhere else. Why stay? You need a reason.

Lena: What about messaging⁴¹?

Mateo: We must control the story⁴². If someone leaks⁴³ the phrase "down-round" without context, people will assume⁴⁴ the company is dying.

Lena: So we must say it ourselves. Before rumours⁴⁵ begin.

Mateo: Exactly. Remote companies⁴⁶ can fall apart⁴⁷ in hours if communication is unclear. Slack becomes a rumour machine.

Lena: I will speak to them live. Not a long email. Not a company memo⁴⁸.

Mateo: Good. And one more thing: support⁴⁹ for those leaving. If departures⁵⁰ feel cold or automated, if they just receive a calendar invite⁵¹, the emotional damage will spread⁵² to the entire team.

Lena: I hate this.

ACT 3: The Plan

Two days later. Back in the boardroom. The plan is ready.

Lena (presenting): We accept the down-round. I will explain to the team:

– The market changed, not just us

– We need to reduce costs

– We believe the product still has a future

Victor: Good start.

Lena: We will reduce headcount by twenty-five percent. Cuts will focus on projects that are not profitable⁵³ or not strategic. We are not removing the core product⁵⁴ team.

Priya: How will you speak to the company?

Lena: I will address⁵⁵ them live on video. I will explain the situation directly⁵⁶. I will not hide⁵⁷ the fact that this is a down-round⁵⁸. If I hide it, people will search for information elsewhere and think we are lying.

Victor: And those leaving?

Lena: They will receive a human conversation, no emails, four weeks of paid transition time⁵⁹, and appropriate⁶⁰ help with finding their next job. If we must lose people, we do it with respect⁶¹.

Priya: And those who remain?

Lena: They will get refreshed stock options. I will say: "Yes, the company is smaller. But your ownership⁶² is now bigger. If we rebuild successfully, you will benefit⁶³."

Victor: Tone?

Lena: Honest⁶⁴, not dramatic. We are not collapsing. We are correcting course⁶⁵.

Priya: That matters. Many teams can accept bad news if it is clear and fair⁶⁶.

Lena: I will also stay available⁶⁷ for questions.

Victor: Good. Uncertainty⁶⁸ destroys trust faster than layoffs.

Lena closes her laptop.

She looks tired, but her voice is **steady**⁶⁹.

Lena: Tomorrow will be the hardest day of my career. But the company will still exist the day after. That is my **responsibility**⁷⁰, and I accept it.

1. Investment & Funding Language

Language for discussing company value, fundraising, and investor expectations.

- **down-round** – an investment round at a lower company valuation than before

The company had to accept a down-round to keep operating.

- **valuation** – the estimated financial value of a company

The new valuation was half of what they achieved last year.

- **runway** – the amount of time a company can operate before it runs out of money

They needed at least eighteen months of runway to **recover**⁷¹.

- **term sheet** – a document that outlines the main conditions of an investment

Victor told Lena the term sheet was final and ready to sign.

- **market correction** – a change in market conditions that lowers prices or valuations

The investors explained that this was a market correction, not a **punishment**⁷².

- **equity refresh** – giving employees new stock options to motivate them to stay

After the layoffs, the company offered an equity refresh to the remaining team.

- **wire the money** – to transfer investment funds electronically

The investor agreed to wire the money as soon as the agreement was signed.

2. Restructuring & Layoff Language

Language for managing cost reductions and explaining why jobs must change or disappear.

- **headcount reduction** – cutting the number of people employed

The board required a twenty-five percent headcount reduction.

- **redundant role**⁷³ – a job that is no longer needed in the new plan

Several sales roles became redundant when the company changed strategy.

- **survivor employees** – workers who remain after layoffs

Without support, survivor employees might quickly leave too.

- **cost-cutting scenario** – a plan showing what happens if spending is reduced by different amounts

The CFO prepared three cost-cutting scenarios for the CEO.

- **core product** – the main product or service the company is built around

They decided not to cut the core product team because it was **essential**⁷⁴.

- **transition support** – help given to employees who are leaving the company

Lena promised transition support so no one would feel

abandoned⁷⁵.

- **respectful exit** – leaving the company with **dignity**⁷⁶, clear information, and fair treatment

A respectful exit makes it more likely that people will speak positively afterward.

3. Crisis Communication & Leadership

Language for communicating difficult news, protecting trust, and keeping morale stable.

- **control the message** – manage how information is communicated to avoid confusion or panic

If leaders do not control the message, rumours will spread instead.

- **live address** – speaking directly to employees in real time, usually by video or meeting

Lena chose to give a live address instead of writing an email.

- **transparency** – honest and open communication about what is happening and why

The board agreed that transparency was the only way to keep trust.

- **stabilise morale** – prevent employee motivation and **confidence**⁷⁷ from falling further

Clear information helps stabilise morale during **uncertain times**⁷⁸.

- **uncertainty kills** – a saying meaning that unclear information is more damaging than bad news

Victor reminded Lena that uncertainty kills startups faster than layoffs.

- **emotional impact** – the feelings caused by a difficult decision, such as fear or sadness

They discussed how to reduce the emotional impact on the team.

- **recommit**⁷⁹ – choose to stay and continue supporting the company after a crisis

Equity refresh helped remaining employees recommit to the company.

Morris Chang (b. 1931)

is a Taiwanese-American engineer who transformed global technology by **found-ing**¹ TSMC, the world's most advanced **chipmaker**². Before TSMC, tech companies had to design and produce their own **semiconductors**³, limiting innovation and access. Chang's "**pure-play foundry**" **model**⁴, fabricating chips for others, freed startups to design without building factories, **fuelling**⁵ the rise of firms like Apple, NVIDIA, and Qualcomm. This **shift**⁶ repositioned Taiwan as a **global tech powerhouse**⁷ and made TSMC vital to everything from smartphones to AI. Today, TSMC produces over 90 percent of the world's most advanced chips. Chang's legacy is not just technical but geopolitical: semiconductors have become the core infrastructure of the modern world.



Jane Goodall (1934–2025)

was a British **primatologist**⁸ and conservationist whose work reshaped how we see animals. With no formal scientific training, she arrived in Gombe, Tanzania in 1960, where her observations of chimpanzees using tools, forming hierarchies, and expressing emotion **upended**⁹ long-held beliefs about human uniqueness. **Earning a PhD**¹⁰ at Cambridge, she later founded the Jane Goodall Institute (1977) to support conservation and **community-led**¹¹ development, and, later, Roots & Shoots, a global youth movement for environmental action. She became a **tireless**¹² public speaker and UN Messenger of Peace. In her final message, released **posthumously**¹³, she **urged**¹⁴ courage in difficult ecological and political times, "Your life matters. What you do every day makes a difference. Don't give up."



Jensen Huang (b. 1963)

is a Taiwanese-American engineer who co-founded NVIDIA and **reshaped**¹⁵ computing by turning **graphics chips**¹⁶ into the engines of the AI revolution. **Originally**¹⁷ designed for video games, NVIDIA's GPUs, under Huang's leadership, have since become essential for training **large-scale**¹⁸ **machine learning models**¹⁹. This has enabled **breakthroughs**²⁰ in fields from autonomous vehicles and medical imaging to climate modelling and generative AI. By democratising access to high-performance computing, Huang **lowered**²¹ barriers for researchers and startups worldwide. In doing so, he helped **unlock**²² a wave of innovation that has transformed global industries. NVIDIA's central role in powering AI infrastructure has made Huang one of the defining figures of 21st-century technology.

Few brands have achieved synonymy with their **country of origin**¹ like Guinness, and a visit to the **Emerald Isle**² is incomplete without **downing a pint**³ of the black gold. There is also a grand story to be told of 19th-century Ireland under British rule, and four siblings **feuding**⁴ following the death of Sir Benjamin Guinness. Throw in Steven Knight, the creator of the hit series *Peaky Blinders*, and *House of Guinness* looks like a **recipe for success**⁵.

While many have **quaffed**⁶ the episodes enthusiastically, **despite**⁷, or perhaps because of the now almost **statutory**⁸ **gratuitous**⁹ sex scenes and **expletives**¹⁰ that come with most adult Netflix series these days, the show has **bombed**¹¹ in its home country. While the Dublin accents are authentic (to the point of **incomprehensibility**¹² for some), critics argue that the Irish characterisation is as clichéd as leprechauns in green suits. For historical purists, the **billing**¹³ as fiction based on fact doesn't cut it. The lighting is dark and menacing, giving the series the feel of a Victorian steampunk horror film. For those who enjoyed *Peaky Blinders* and are not too worried about accuracy, it may well provide an enjoyable **romp**¹⁴ through the **brewery**¹⁵ and dirty washing of the Guinness family. Best enjoyed with a glass of stout and a **pinch of salt**¹⁶.

The Seven Rules of Trust: A *Blueprint* for Building Things That Last – Jimmy Wales with Dan Gardner

Wikipedia founder Jimmy Wales teams up with journalist Dan Gardner to explore how trust **underpins**² every lasting organisation. In *The Seven Rules of Trust*, they argue that amid today's declining confidence in institutions, trust has become a super-power – the invisible currency that determines whether teams, companies and **communities**³ succeed or fail. While many people dismissed the online encyclopaedia in the early days, it has established itself as a leading model of collaborative human **enterprise**⁴, so we can give Wales the **benefit of the doubt**⁵ in knowing what he is talking about.

The book **sets out**⁶ seven practical “rules:” purpose, transparency, reliability, empowerment, connection, renewal, and alignment, showing how leaders can build credibility and **resilience**⁷ through consistent behaviour rather than slogans. **Drawing on**⁸ Wales's experience managing one of the world's largest volunteer networks, the book blends insight and accessibility, with real-world examples replacing management jargon.

It is a timely and engaging read for anyone interested in leadership, culture, or organisational longevity, and you could also reflect on it at a personal level. While the subject matter isn't entirely new, Wales's first-hand perspective and Gardner's clear **prose**⁹ give it freshness and authority. The framework is straightforward, widely applicable and easy to understand and digest. Readers seeking deep academic analysis may find it **errs towards**¹⁰ the practical and anecdotal more than scientific evidence.

The Seven Rules of Trust is an easy-to-read guide to process of rebuilding trust. It is well worth **dipping into**¹¹ to **pick out**¹² some useful perspectives and ideas.
